

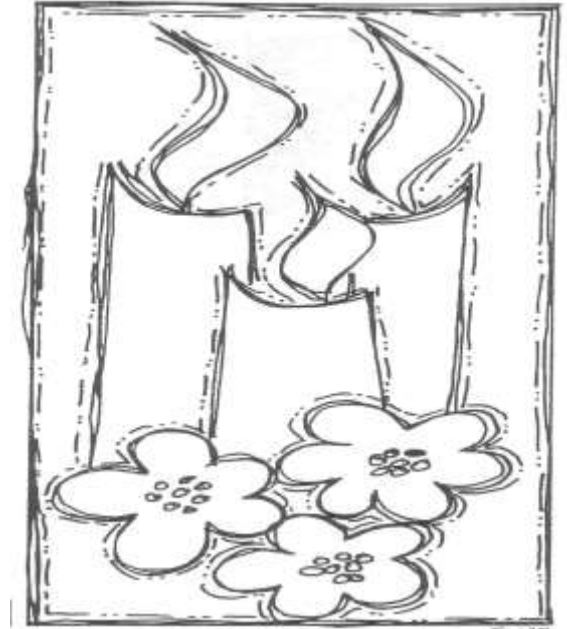

SOMETHING TO THINK ABOUT

...and in Jesus Christ his only Son our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary (The Apostles' Creed).

Last Sunday evening our youth leaders, Elle and Jerry, along with other members of the youth group organised and led a wonderful youth service. Hospitality and fellowship were shared with youth from other churches. Daniel, a university student from Queanbeyan Uniting Church, who is active in the local Faith Based Refugee Working Group challenged us to live out our faith in welcoming the stranger. Daniel also spoke about how much the refugees and asylum seekers whom he had spoken with valued being prayed for.

After Daniel spoke there was an opportunity to light a candle and pray, to walk the labyrinth, to listen to a refugee from Syria perform a rap on You Tube in the chapel, to make some Christmas craft and to write prayers and words of welcome in chalk on the ground. The service finished with a sacramental action of dipping a piece of apple in honey. Elle explained this was a Jewish tradition from the new year festival of Rosh Hashanah. The apple symbolised the year just been and the honey the year ahead.

New beginnings are longed for by so many. In our faith community Advent symbolises the expectation of God's new way being born amongst us. Each week in our bulletin we read about new beginnings forged from brave decisions and resilience by the clients and volunteers at St John's Care. For asylum seekers in detention and in our community, we long with them for the chance to begin a new life in safety and with hope.

Mary, the mother of Jesus, knew what it meant to welcome something new and unexpected. Rowan Williams in his book *Tokens of Trust*, which I've been reading this Advent, discusses aspects of the Nicene Creed and the Apostles Creed. Chapter 3 is called *A Man for All Seasons* and he concludes the chapter with a reflection on Mary.

"When the creed says that these two ways of looking at Jesus' birth, through the Spirit and through Mary, both need to be affirmed, it says that we can't think of the life of Jesus as just the result of what human history throws up, another episode in the world. God's action underpinning and animating the world must be particularly near the surface here. Yet it is also human history that opens the way." (p.75)

Mary is asked to take responsibility in a distinct way for God in the world. Her saying "yes", her consent and openness to God's inbreathing is unique but not in isolation. Williams sees Mary as our older sister who helps us to grow and discover things. Just as Mary made Jesus possible in that place, and at that time, her example inspires us to be God-bearers in our place, and at our time. We hear alongside her that, "Nothing is impossible for God" (Luke 1:37). Yes!

A Great News Story!

Back in April this year, I had a woman called Sue (not her real name) come to see me. She was very anxious and highly distraught about having her children taken into care in Western Australia.

Sue's is a very complex story of a marriage breakdown, cultural conflict, misunderstandings and a long and quite bitter battle with the authorities in Western Australia in relation to her children. Ultimately, there was a Court order for her children to be taken in to care and to remain there until they were 18 years old. Both were under 10 at the time.

I listened to her story, read the Court orders and other documents and based on this information, took the view that, in my opinion, an injustice had been done to her and her children. We met on quite a few occasions, including a meeting with Legal Aid, a teleconference with the authorities in WA and a supervised telephone call with each of her children.

The acrimonious relationship that had developed between Sue and the WA department and the fact that we were dealing across geographical jurisdictions, made the matter even more complex. We continued to provide support, emergency relief assistance and letters of support over some months. For long periods, it appeared that although Sue had sought the assistance of a very wide range of organisations and individuals, there was no movement towards any change.

Then just last month the WA department made contact saying that they wanted to come to the ACT to assess Sue's current ability to care for her children. We met in Wild Honey with Sue, some of her family, another local agency and the WA officers.

As a direct result of the support that Sue was being provided by St John's Care and others, the decision was made to recommend the return of her children to her care.

Last Friday Sue came into the office with a big smile on her face and advised that her children were booked on the plane to come to Canberra on Friday. I got the biggest hug ever! I even got an invitation to attend the "welcome home" party.

This was one of the most complex and long standing cases that I have been involved with in my time in Canberra and I am just so glad that Sue has an opportunity for a new beginning with her children. I look forward to meeting them and providing whatever ongoing support they may need.

It gives me great joy to offer you blessings and peace in this season of Advent as we look towards the coming of the light and wisdom celebrated at Christmas.

2016 has been an eventful and exciting year for the Centre. We have had two art exhibitions; our Asylum Seeker art exhibition in February was followed in November by a *Seasons of Birth* exhibition.

The inaugural winner of the Centre's Religious Short Film Prize was celebrated in August. The Centre has hosted numerous consultations and scholar's forums in ecumenics, climate change and foreign aid; as well as many wonderful addresses sponsored by Christians for an Ethical Society with whom we work closely.

The Christian Muslim National Dialogue continued in 2016 as an expression of the Centre's commitment to inter-religious dialogue and witness. The Centre continues to be an excellent place for creative liturgical events and retreats offering spiritual sustenance for a hungry world.

The rains in Canberra in 2016 have made the 6 hectares of the Centre quite a picture especially the Bible Garden. To celebrate this wonderful garden the Centre has produced a Bible Garden Booklet for which we are extremely grateful to the author, Mr John Miller. The Centre has also produced a substantial booklet that gives an introduction to the vision, history and programs of the Centre. This is a complement to another resource that introduces visitors to spiritual pilgrimage at the Centre. In this respect in 2016 the Centre has hosted visits from hundreds of school children who have explored the secrets of the place. The Board of the Centre and the newly formed Friends of the Centre have worked hard to promote the unique vision of the Centre to reconnect issues of faith and culture in challenging and transitional times. This requires a fresh wisdom for the common good and that is what the Centre is about. It is indeed a remarkable gift that at the heart of the nation's capital the Centre occupies a place that faces the churches, the academy and the public space and draws these three areas of life together in creative dialogue.

We are excited about what has been achieved and look forward to 2017. We are grateful for your continued interest, support and prayer. The e-bulletin that follows highlights some of the events and achievements for 2016 and flags some important events for 2017. Thank you all your support.
