Charles Dickens gave us the classic work, *A Tale of Two Cities*, which begins with the famous lines. 'It was the best of times; it was the worst of times.' In the readings today we might call them a 'Tale of Two Communities.' They are about two faith communities that existed in the first century, and shed light on our own community.

The community of faith in the book of Acts still basks in the glow of the resurrection. The memory of Christ is fresh; he seems almost present. The apostles are alive and brimming over with faith. It's an ideal Christian community, whose numbers are increasing daily.

John's Gospel was written for a much different community. Forty to fifty years have passed since the resurrection. The memory of Christ is fading. Many of the eye witnesses have died. John's community is in reality two communities – those who knew the Lord first hand and those who came to believe through the testimony of others.

John tells the story of the skeptic Thomas for this second community of how Jesus invited him to put out

his hand and touch him and doing so Thomas believed.

If we think about it, we are like John's community. We have people whose faith is alive and need no physical proof to believe. But we have to admit there is a second community. Those whose faith is not as strong, those who are challenged by doubt. Perhaps we saw some of these people at the Easter Service, perhaps they are still with us today.

When we come together in worship we do so as one people enhanced by those around us, we know. But what of the one standing by you who you don't know? After the final blessing turn to them and introduce yourself, invite them to coffee. Go on, invite them and let's make us one community, not two. It's amazing how Christ's presence comes in the drinking of coffee and the eating of food.


A little kindness can change a 'Tale of Two Communities,' into a sacred story of one community in Christ.

The book is '*Joy and Compassion: Stories and Prayers for a Life of Faith*' (Coventry Press, Melb. 384 pages).

Rev. Susan Joy was a deacon and writes from her extensive experience as a hospice/hospital pastoral carer, school chaplain, and family minister. In her words, the book is "my voice, on faith and how to live as a person of faith in this world". It is a collection of 86 story-oriented reflections, each focussed on a specific aspect of faith life (e.g. 'Called', 'Hope', 'Peace', 'Searching', 'Scarred').

Each reflection is accompanied by a directly-related prayer, and ends with a question or comment for thought or action. Stories are from the Bible, but also from life, literature, movies, and beyond.

After Susan Joy passed away in August 2018, her husband Maurice discovered the extent of her writings and compiled, edited, organised, and prepared them as a coherent text.

## FOOD ASSISTANCE MADE A TANGIBLE POSITIVE IMPACT

Recently I was making some follow up phone calls to enquire about some of our clients and check their progress.

Unfortunately, one of the clients told me she was in the hospital. I remembered DY from a few weeks ago when she came to the St John's Care Centre to ask for assistance with some bills.

She has five children under 15 years of age. She told me that she had been admitted to Canberra Hospital with severe pain caused by an abscess a week prior. She was recovering well but had no income for that week and all five children were staying at her friend's house. DY is a single mother who, prior to that incident, was working part-time as a coffee shop food and beverage attendant.

I asked her if she needed any assistance and what kind. She indicated that it would be of great help if we could provide food for her children as it was a bit of a strain on her friend. We organised for her friend S to come to SJC to collect a food package including fresh fruit, veggies, and snacks for the children for school lunches.

When we met S, we came to realise that she also needed some support with food, toiletries, and household cleaning items. S told me that her own two children loved honey on toast and honey was too expensive for them to buy in the shops. They would usually have a home brand syrup on toast as a substitute. When we gave S a couple of jars of honey (one for her kids and one for DY's children) she beamed and couldn't thank us enough!

Later that afternoon we received a phone call from Canberra Hospital. It was DY calling to say a huge thank you to SJC donors. Her voice was trembling..."I couldn't have imagined a more positive impact than this, you guys have made a world of difference to me, my family and my friend's family. You saved us from struggling for the next few weeks".

The good news is that DY is scheduled to be discharged early next week. She said she is feeling optimistic about life, however, she and her children still need support until she is fully recovered and can return to work. SJC will continue to provide this family with food and basic necessities for the interim.

That is where SJC's and our donors' generous help counts. We can focus on the specific help a person/family require at any one a time.
