Your Lenten Journey (Luke 4: 1-15)

What are you planning to do during Lent this year? Maybe your first response was, what is Lent? Historically, Lent is a season of fasting for 40 days. People often abstain from things like sugar or chocolate as if Lent were just a time for self-denial. A fuller picture sees the season punctuated by Sundays, where the fast can be broken with days of celebration.

We're not doing Lent well if we've misunderstood its deeper spiritual purpose. First, is to get in touch with our humanity. As Christians who live comfortably, it's easy to assume that everything comes easy to everyone. Comfortable people don't have to make hard choices. They don't experience as much stress or worry. One bad event is not likely to set off a chain reaction that can affect children, work, housing and family life.

Lent is about connecting with the experience of others. It's about choosing to know a little more about life which does not work the way we want. It may not be such a bad thing at a time when the Ukrainian and Russian peoples are experiencing hardship through war and economic collapse while Europe frets about nuclear catastrophe.

The second purpose is to get in touch with God. The point of Lent is to make space for God's grace in our lives by reflecting a little on all the things that stop us from growing into the fullness of Christ. A little hardship can make us thirsty for God.

Lent can make us more attuned to the opportunities to take God's road. It can help us to recognise the indifference and exhaustion that we take for granted. It can bring the difficulties and temptations that surround us into new light.

When Jesus fasted, three temptations emerged: easy prosperity, unaccountable power and foolhardy religion. Each sought to distract Jesus from God's mission to help the world to flourish. Empty bellies, souls and spirits distract many still.

Lent is an opportunity for us to think about our need for prosperity, authority and affirmation in a safe way. Why not use the next six weeks to get in touch with what matters to you? What hinders your capacity to love? What interest has stirred in your soul but there's not been the time or energy to pursue it? If a little bit of hardship brought Jesus' calling into sharper focus it might just do the same for you.

Sound Operator

The sound operator assists the sanctuary party during services of worship or pastoral offices such as a wedding, funeral and baptism by operating the sound equipment.

Time required: approx. 1 hour/week

Duties: The sound operator is responsible for:

- The effective operation of the audio equipment used during a service or for broadcast or recordings
- Using Powerpoint when services are projected on the screen

Key Requirements:

- Understand and operate the sound desk, microphones and projector effectively
- Operate in a safe, calm and methodical manner, able to adapt to sudden change, and responsive to needs of the sanctuary party, participants or viewers

Training/mentoring available for interested people.

ABM's new Lenten Study for 2022, 'Repairing the Breach', is now available. Included are seven studies that take you from Ash Wednesday to Palm Sunday.

Repairing the Breach examines what it means to be people of healing in a broken world. Written by a community of friends for a people of mission — and illustrated with stunning images painted by acclaimed artist, Carol Aust, 'Repairing the Breach' inspires, provokes and cajoles.

The Mission of God is to repair the breach. The people of God are participants in that work. All breach-repair is relational.

A shamed and scared humanity looks at an immutable God, terrified to approach for fear of rejection and judgement. God, taking the ultimate risk, becomes human, builds relationships, steps into our shoes, loves us and is loved by us. God steps towards us. We step towards God. The Breach is repaired.

A poor community watches in despair as the wealthy nations chase further wealth. A visitor comes, not with answers, but with questions. Dialogue ensues. Every member of the community is consulted. Plans are made. Action is taken together. The breach is lessened. Love, hope, and justice begin their work.
