Next Steps

Last week's readings provoked us to meet the challenges before us, receive the courage that comes from our God, and to continue Jesus' work of justice. This week, the readings offer us some guidance on our next steps. One significant step is to reject the idea that suffering is God's punishment for sin and blessing God's reward for righteousness.

In Luke 13:1-9, Jesus reminds us that sometimes people are just in the wrong place and the wrong time, and they end up dead. The Galileans weren't killed because of their sins—they were brutally murdered by Roman soldiers on Pilate's command. The same for the people who died when the tower at Siloam collapsed—they were no better or worse humans than anyone else in Jerusalem, but they still died.

What Jesus doesn't do is minimise the significance of these tragic events. And we must ensure that we do not minimise the significance of the tragedies that are impacting on our world today either. The suffering of the poor, the sick, the disabled and the marginalized is **not** God's judgment on them. We must never let ourselves fall into the trap of

blaming those individuals for their situations. Where the judgement should fall is on the systems that allow and even create such suffering. Climate change, war and economic crisis impact most heavily on the most vulnerable people within our communities. Jesus is calling us to serve and protect this cohort, not to look after our own self -interests.

It's really easy to look away from pain and suffering. We can decide that we have seen enough of the war in Ukraine, or the floods in NSW and Qld. We can avoid making eye contact with the person at the shops selling the Big Issue, or the homeless person begging for money. We can chose not call out our friend or family member who makes jokes about 'WuFlu' or domestic violence. But God uses the suffering of others to speak loudly to us. C.S. Lewis calls suffering 'God's megaphone'. Today, tomorrow, and in the days to come, God is calling us to repent of our avoidance and self-protection. We are being called to bear the fruit of caring, compassionate action on behalf of those who suffer.

How can you escape complacency? Today, who needs you to offer compassion and help?

A NEW START

Earlier this week I returned to the precinct from dropping food to a

client. As I drove in, I saw a woman who I thought I recognised walking up towards the St John's Care Centre. I parked the car, got closer and realised that she was a client who has been using our service for several years, however something she looked quite different this time around.

We sat down on a wooden bench and began to discuss how she had been, as it had been a couple of months since I had seen her last.

J is a young woman who had lived with her abusive partner for almost 4 years. During many of her previous visits to SJC, she had shown physical signs of domestic violence, and had recalled horrifying details of her abusive relationship.

The relationship had escalated last year, when her then partner set fire to part of her home, forcing her into emergency accommodation and in fear for her life. Last year SJC assisted J with the costs of moving to emergency accommodation and provided her with food, clothing, and cleaning supplies.

J was ecstatic to inform me that she had recently moved into a single bedroom apartment, had cut all ties with her ex-partner and some bad influences in her life. She had also successfully steered clear of the allure of drugs and alcohol for over three months.

Additionally, she had enrolled to begin an online course to study community services, as she is eager to give back to the industry which has supported her over the last few years.

St John's Care will continue to support her with food, assistance with her Internet and schooling fees, as well as providing a support pillar for her as she progresses through her life.

Hearing stories like this first-hand from our clients serves as a great reminder of the important role SJC has in assisting members of the community with recovery from trauma, and growth and development moving past it.

I would like to thank all the donors, volunteers and supporters who have made contributions to SJC which have helped people like J.







Godly Play

Two weeks ago I attended three days of Godly Play training. It was eye-opening, encouraging, inspiring and restorative (for me!). Godly Play tells Bible stories experientially, in such a way that God might speak to people through the story and give wisdom for their everyday life. It is not just an intellectual or entertainment exercise, it is one which invites contemplation and transformation. In a noisy, outcomes focused world, Godly Play turns everything upside down and focuses on nurturing and inspiring relationship, and encourages participants to wonder about the mystery of God and belonging to a community. With thanks to Godly Play trainer Caryl Menkhus – Crewell, a typical Godly Play practice involves:

Getting Ready – preparing, slowing down, opening hearts, anticipating that of God in each other.

Crossing the Threshold – Choosing to leave one space and enter another, bringing one's whole self and being fully present. Coming with doubts, fears, failings and convictions, joys and strengths.

Building the Circle – Extending and receiving welcome, supporting each other's learning by giving and receiving hospitality. We make room for all to take their place.

Telling and Listening to the Story – Using an economy of words and gestures, we use story to listen to our own story.

Wondering – We speak our truth in the circle in ways that respect other people's truth and their wondering. No fixing, saving, advising or setting straight. We attempt to listen to others and ourselves more deeply.

Silence—We treat silence as a member of the group, silence is a gift in a noisy world and a way of knowing in itself. We speak to improve on silence.

Response – We respond to each other with open, honest questions and practice attending and responding to our own inner teacher: paying close attention to our own reactions and responses.

Prayers and Feast – Feasting is about who we are with, not how much we get. We take the time to express what is most deeply true and important.

Blessing – We call out the best in each other and say 'yes' to who we are most authentically are. Our ability to bless comes first out of our deep knowing that we are blessed. We are called to have the courage to be our most authentic and unique self.

Leaving – We leave the circle with whatever

we needed when we joined the circle. We will continue to grow in the days ahead. Wherever we go, the light of this time and



each other will be wherever and whenever we need it.
