Watching the ABC News 24 broadcast of the South Australian election count (yes, I really am that much of a politics tragic), I was struck by how very different that environment was to many other previous broadcasts. I think that the key take-away from that broadcast is the power of reconciliation.

Like the church in Corinth, we have a tendency to stick people in boxes and then exclude them as a result (1 Cor.11). In political terms, we see each other as a caricature of a political platform or a potential threat, rather than acknowledging each other as humans, equally beloved by God. It is very easy, and very human, to look down on those who do not share our convictions. But in doing so, we risk turning ourselves into the prodigal's older brother (Luke 15:11-32), complaining to God about blessing the "others" too much.

It was refreshing last week to see the LNP and ALP leaders and representatives looking first for what they had in common, rather than their differences; engaging in a "ministry of reconciliation" (1 Cor.11:18). Peter Malinauskas reminded his party faithful of the need for compassion for those who had lost their seats, and particularly for the families of

those people. He called for empathy and understanding, skills which are rarely appreciated or encouraged in politicians and political debate.

The other reconciliation point that shone through Premier-elect Malinauskas' speech was the importance of reconciliation with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Australians. This reconciliation is about restoring relationships, not just apportioning blame or punishing. This is restorative justice in action — what Kehinde Wiley calls "an economy of grace". How do we manufacture and value grace and honour, and who do we bestow that grace and honour upon?

We cannot heal what has not been acknowledged. Once hurt has been spoken and heard, restorative justice like that shown in the story of the Prodigal Son can begin. This is why the Uluru Statement calls for a Makarrata Commission. Noel Pearson explains Makarrata as being "about two parties coming together after a struggle, healing the divisions of the past. It is about acknowledging that something has been done wrong, and seeks to make things right".

This Lent, may we all apply the principle of Makarrata to our lives and relationships.

Always willing to support

Two weeks ago, we received a client named R who was

looking for some food. R said one of her closest friends suggested she come to our service and had said that St John's Care are helpful and empathetic.

R and I decided to go under the tree and sit on the bench to have a chat. She began to chat about her new life in Australia and how she came to Australia with the help of a religious group. R has now been in Australia for approximately 10 years. She is still part of the religious group and living with other members.

R was explaining that the religious group provides basic food, accommodation and only one bathroom that (all residents are required to share).

Two years ago, she sustained an injury - a hip fracture - and is why she uses crutches for support.

She also explained that she has a couple of intolerances and allergies. Her religious group can't provide her with food to accommodate for her needs. Before her injury she was able to work to earn money that helped her buy her 'special' food. But now, due to her injury, she is unable to work. She asked if SJC could help her with natural products, vegan products, and preservative-free foods.

R is going through a difficult time mainly due to the hip fracture. She suffers from stress because she is constantly short of food and struggles to find the special food she needs. She has no close family nearby and she is getting older. She said it is very hard to cope with a situation such as this when you don't have emotional support and feel as though your last days are coming.

R is a perfect example of someone who needs support of organizations like St John's Care to enable her to get her back on her feet. St John's Care was able to support R with all her food needs; we also offer her counselling support or simply connection over a cup of tea or coffee, seating on a comfy bench under a magnificent tree. When you support St John's Care, you're not only supporting people's physical needs — you're supporting the whole person, at the most difficult times of their lives.




FOGO Update

The Parish is participating in the FOGO bin trial. That means that the FOGO bin is available for food and garden waste. A reminder that compostable packaging (like sugar cane plates or bamboo utensils) don't qualify for the FOGO bin. We must also keep out items that could potentially contaminate the compost such as tea bags which can have staples or plastic in them as well as fruit stickers.

Key things to keep our FOGO bin contamination free:

- empty food from packaging
- ensure that you only use certified compostable liners in the FOGO bin.

Bible Reader

Do you enjoy reading aloud? Do Old Testament names send a frisson of excitement down your spine? You could join the bible reading team.

Readers are responsible for assisting the sanctuary party during services by reading a passage of-Scripture or other appropriate text.

Requirements:

- Be dressed appropriately and fit for the occasion
- Reading clearly, confidently and in a manner appropriate to the occasion
- Be capable of following directions and guidance of the sanctuary team
- Work collaboratively and respectfully with members of the sanctuary party and all who play supportive roles

Creation Care during Lent

Compelled by God's saving love for all people, and all of Creation, the Public Issues Commission has highlighted two resources that might be of interest for use during Lent.

The first resource is the Doing Justice Lent Calendar 2022 which is produced by the Diocese of Southern Queensland. It has Scripture readings, reflections and suggested actions for each week during Lent.



The calendar is available in a variety of formats and may be downloaded through <u>Doing Justice Facebook</u> <u>page</u>.



The second resource is about Australia's Overshoot Day, which happened on 23 March. This is the day when our nation's demand for natural resources exceeds the capacity of creation to renew itself in a year. The day seeks to promote better care for creation and the need for transformation in our lives. You may have seen a post about this on our Facebook page.

Safe Ministry Information System

There has recently been an exciting development in the Diocesan management of Safe Ministry requirements. The Diocese has announced that the Online Safe Ministry System (SMIS) is operational.

The Diocese has asked that all parishioners who volunteer in any role in any parish complete their Safe Ministry screening requirements on SMIS. This means that you will need to:

- Register on <u>SMIS via this link</u> This will allow you to create a profile on SMIS. You will recieve a confirmation email with a user name and temporary password. You will then need to create your own password.
- 2. When you are creating your Primary Record, you will be asked to select a Ministry Unit and a Ministry Classification. Your Ministry Unit is Holy Covenant Parish (this should appear in the drop down list provided). Your Ministry Classification depends on your role within the Parish. When you select a classification, the relevant safe ministry requirements will pop up.
