What do you value most? (John 12:1-8, Philippians 3:4b-14)

Let's reflect on what we value most. A recent survey showed that Americans valued 'time' first, with career, success and money coming in a close second. What we value most is likely demonstrated by how we spend our time and resources. At one point the apostle Paul spent all his time and resources pursuing and persecuting Christians. When he wrote to the Philippians, he had changed course in his life and begun spending all his time and resources pursuing and preaching Christ. This turn around shows what Paul valued most.

Paul values knowing Christ because he sees this is the only way he will be able to stand before God. Paul wants to be 'found in Christ'. In light of this what is it that we value most as individuals and as a church community? Perhaps we tend to value certain inherited qualities or achievements as 'gains' that give us value before God. Lent is a time for examining our lives and our faith so we may count

such gains as loss and deepen our reliance on Christ.

Our gospel story shows that Lazarus is alive again. (That sets up so many thoughts and questions in my mind) His sisters are playing out their roles with Martha serving and Mary at Jesus feet. Mary's perfume wafts its fragrance through the house as she lathers Jesus' feet with it. Judas is critical of such waste of an expensive ointment but Mary would give all she had for Jesus. Judas lived in a world that revolved around himself which proved destructive, but Mary chose the way of self-giving.

Paul gave up everything, his pride of birth, upbringing and character, in order to obey the strange gospel of a crucified Messiah. He followed Christ and discovered that continual selfgiving, pouring out of his energy, devotion and life itself, caused him to fully dedicate to filling the world with the fragrance of the gospel. It's worth taking a minute in this season of Lent to reflect on such matters.

COLLECTIVE EFFORT

Early this week I attended a client conference with

members from numerous supporting agencies. We met to discuss the plan of action moving forward for a shared client of ours who has been living in transitional housing in a one-bedroom flat in Canberra.

T is a migrant who moved to Australia with his family 11 years ago, fleeing his homeland in search for safety and an opportunity to start a new life with this wife and two children. As is so often the case, T's family arrived in Australia with almost no possessions and a renewed sense of optimism about their future.

Shortly after arrival, T began working as a contractor in the construction industry, picking up shifts 3-4 days a week and earning enough to support his loved ones. The family was never well off but enjoyed the opportunity they had been given in Australia, and the laid-back Canberra lifestyle.

In 2020 when COVID-19 first began impacting Australians, the construction industry slowly but surely lost momentum, and contracting work began harder to find. T recalls the financial implications that this had on his family, and how they became the focal point of rising tensions between himself and his wife.

In 2021, when the little savings that they held had dried up, T and his wife were relying on the community for food, social and financial support. At this stage, T reached out to St John's Care for support with food, and some basic utility bills.

T and his partner split soon after and the pair have been going through a bitter separation ever since. As there were no longer four people living in the house, T was moved to a one-bedroom flat where he still lives to this day. His ex-partner was given a two-bedroom apartment, where she hosts the children for 10 days out of each fortnight.

Since then, T's ex-partner began drinking excessively and the children have reported their concerns to T when staying with him. On top of her drinking habits, the children have often gone to school with unwashed uniforms, no lunch or have missed school entirely.

In the months leading up the conference members from several agencies advocated for ACT housing to provide T with a two-bedroom unit, and to have sole custody of his children. After months, T burst into tears as we informed him that he had secured a new home, and that his children would be living under his care moving forward.

He thanked each person in attendance for their support, and their ability to refer him between services in order to achieve a positive outcome for himself and his family. We are currently assisting T with the costs of moving to his new residence and have secured some furniture items for the family through our donors. We have referred T to a job agency and he is excited to attend an interview next week.

This story is one of many examples of St John's Care's ability to support clients' transition through adversity and the strength of banding together with other support agencies for our clients.

I would like to thank our donors and supporters who help us support our clients each day.


Volunteering at Holy Covenant

Safe Ministry Information System

There has recently been an exciting development in the Diocesan management of Safe Ministry requirements. The Diocese has announced that the Online Safe Ministry System (SMIS) is operational.

The Diocese has asked that all parishioners who volunteer in any role in any parish complete their Safe Ministry screening requirements on SMIS. This means that you will need to:

- 1. Register on SMIS via this link This will allow you to create a profile on SMIS. You will recieve a confirmation email with a user name and temporary password. You will then need to create your own password.
- 2. When you are creating your Primary Record, you will be asked to select a Ministry Unit and a Ministry Classification. Your Ministry Unit is Holy Covenant Parish (this should appear in the drop down list provided). Your Ministry Classification depends on your role within the Parish. When you select a classification, the relevant safe ministry requirements will pop up.

If you require any assistance with this process, please call the Safe Ministry Unit at the Diocesan Office. Erica Dawes is the best person to contact. Her phone number is 6245 7160, and she works Tuesday—Thursday.
