HALLELUJAH – Jesus Christ is risen today!

But now the power of Easter has burst upon us with the resurrection of Christ. To get to this day of Easter celebration we have had to journey through Lent with Jesus. If we haven't taken that journey, then Easter Sunday will be a bit of a shallow celebration. We need to experience the highs and lows of the stories, and feel the tears, the grief, the abandonment of Jesus in our hearts, as he endured all of this alone because no one understood what is and what was to come. There was the Passover. There was the last supper. There was his best

friend Peter claiming to not know him. There was Gethsemane. There was the entry into Jerusalem. There was the trial. There was the resurrection. Just pause a moment and imagine all of these events as if you were there. For us in hindsight, we know the story in the big picture, we know how it has a wonderful life saving ending.

I wonder what your journey has been through Lent. Have you felt the highs and lows? I wonder what you did with the' inbetween day,' the day between Good Friday and Easter Day? Does it feel to you like a sacred space, or perhaps it's a day you are not sure how you should live.

In our very comfortable world we celebrate Easter with ceremony and family time, remembering the saving love and grace of Jesus. I can't help wondering what the Easter message will be in the churches of Ukraine. In the joy of celebrating the risen Christ may we remember the suffering, pain and abandonment of Ukraine and pray for their day of resurrection.

COST OF LIVING STRUGGLES

Last week one of our volunteers was

met by a man who came to the St John's Care Centre and was in desperate need of support. After a quick conversation with the man, the volunteer recognised that he needed more than just the support of our pantry and came to my office to find me.

I stepped outside and saw a man who was clearly feeling dejected. His shoulders were slumped, and his head bowed as he stared at the ground in front of him. I introduced myself and asked whether he would like to sit down in the sun.

We walked through the church gardens and found a warm spot to have a private conversation. K was born and raised in Canberra and has spent his entire life here. When he was 11, his mother passed away from cancer, leaving his father to raise him and his two siblings.

Struggling to deal with the grief of losing his wife, his father turned to alcohol and drugs, and the family dynamic quickly became unhealthy. K was often left alone in charge of his siblings, and was forced to grow up at a very young age. When he was 17, K left home and began couch surfing with friends. Unfortunately, this lifestyle led to him mixing with what he describes as, "the wrong crowd".

"I had no father figure in my life, and no guidance. I was angry and frustrated and I couldn't understand why this was happening to me" he said.

"Over the last ten years I have had my own struggles with drugs, alcohol, the law; and I am still struggling to come to terms with my broken family."

K spent two months incarcerated for theft and was released last year. "Going to prison was what I needed. I was sober for the first time in years, and it put things into perspective for me," he said.

Following prison, K turned his life around. He began working in construction 3-4 days a week and found a

one-bedroom apartment to call his own. Unfortunately, with the recent rise in petrol, utility bills and food, K was now slowly going into debt, and was deeply concerned about the prospect of being homeless once again. Like many of our clients, increased costs had tipped K over the edge, and living was no longer affordable.

I tried to settle his concerns and explained the multiple ways in which SJC could help. Our volunteers prepared some groceries complete with fruit, vegetables, meat and dairy, and some pots and pans for his kitchen.

Through our relationship with ActewAGL, we were able to reduce his gas and electricity bills by \$100 each. We gave K a voucher to purchase a small efficient oil heater, saving him having to use the old and expensive gas heater in his home. Additionally, we referred him to the Home Energy Efficiency program which provides a free household energy assessment, and modifications to make homes more energy efficient.

K was overrun with emotions when our chat finished. He thanked the staff and volunteers for their generosity and will come back fortnightly for food support. We look forward to supporting K over the coming months and continuing to see him better himself.
