Listen - The Voice of Your God is Calling

God whispers to us in our pleasures, speaks to us in our conscience, but shouts in our pains: it is his megaphone to rouse a deaf world. (CS Lewis)

Where shall the word be found, where will the word enough silence. (TS Eliot)

'My sheep hear my voice. I know them, and they follow me.' These words speak reassuringly to our need for relationship, security and direction in a complex and uncertain world.

Some of the voices we are exposed to are life-giving. Other voices – accusing, demanding, enticing, or frankly fear mongering — prey on our fears. This is a familiar tactic in both advertising and political spin. Many, like the false prophets of old offer solutions that are not real or just, or distractions that don't satisfy for long.

How do we remain open and not be led astray? We need to learn to listen - to improve our voice recognition software. As Monica Brown suggests, to 'listen with the ears of our heart'.

It can be easy to be overwhelmed by what is going on in the world at the moment. We can be tempted to tune out. But tuning out will not help unless we also tune in. Wise people through the ages (including Jesus) have known the importance of having time out from the pressures of daily living, not only for refreshment, but to keep them on track with God's call to them. And sometimes, like Elijah, Resound? Not here, there is not we must endure the whirlwind and earthquake, before we hear the still, small voice within (1 Kings 19).

> One way of improving our voice recognition software is to pause to reflect prayerfully on the day. We begin by thanking God for the blessings of the day. Then we allow ourselves to recall with compassion for ourselves and others any disturbing or unsettling experiences – especially in terms of how we responded - before releasing them to God. (We may of course be prompted to make reparation.) The idea is that over time we become more aware of, and more aligned with what is life-giving what leads to greater compassion, love, peace and joy for us and for our world.

Clients with complex needs

At St John's Care we have several clients looking for support with both basic needs, and more complex issues such as legal advice or financial assistance.

Last week a client told me that she was going through some difficult times, and that she was facing legal problems. T spoke about a person that she knew who asked her for money to start a small business. Unfortunately, the deal failed and in the end the person kept the money. Sadly, she had been scammed.

During our chat I contacted Care Financial and was able to discuss the situation with a financial counsellor. Care Financial will support T with all manner of financial and legal advice. SJC helped her book an appointment with a language specific financial counsellor.

T explained that she requires multiple tests and an MRI scan to be able to diagnose the illness she suffers from. She said she has a couple of food intolerances, and a doctor has recommended she consumes only natural and fresh products.

SJC was able to provide support with food (fruit, vegetables, fresh meat, and nonperishable items). We explained to T that she can come to the Centre weekly for food if required. We were also able to provide support with bus tickets, prescription vouchers and her electricity bill.

Sometimes it is evident that our clients simply need some human contact to help make them feel calmer and happier. Other times just a few minutes to speak and be heard without judgement and be supported by organisations within the community can make all the difference. T was so grateful and had a smile on her face when she left.



Followed by AGM 1.30pm at the Cathedral Hall



Church Fete Coordinator


Yes, you read that correctly. COVID-willing, the church fete is returning this year, on 5 November! (Please save the date.)

Workshop presented by: Elizabeth MacKinlay, Elizabeth Pringle and Corinne Trevitt.

18-19 May 2022 at the Australian Centre for Christianity and Culture.

Corinne Trevitt and Elizabeth MacKinlay wrote in the learning guide on spiritual reminiscence: "Spiritual reminiscence is a way of telling a life



story with an emphasis on what gives meaning to life, what has given joy or brought sadness" (MacKinlay & Trevitt 2015, p.46). For nearly two decades we have built up a process of bringing life story and meaning to older people that is affirming and of value to them, individually and in small groups.

While spiritual reminiscence is valuable for people with or without dementia, we have found it is particularly valuable for people who have dementia. We have used the process with people who are growing older and simply wish to explore the meaning of their lives, and we have found that the same needs for meaning are held by people who have dementia. Being in touch with meaning in our lives is vital for our well-being as we grow older.

Nungalinya College News

The first Bible Garden is open. Highlights include the Tree of Knowledge of Good and Evil (cycad), Tree of Life (bush apple) various other fruiting trees, the alpha & omega footpath and especially, the mural and amazing artworks

reflecting on the days of creation. An interactive QR code system also enables people to learn more about the artists and watch mini-sermons in over 10 First Languages on Genesis 1-3. You can explore the garden on YouTube.



The final 'Languages

Workshop' for the current funding round enabled Elders from twelve First Languages to met together for a workshop on the 'Scriptural Way of the Cross' covering events from the garden of Gethsemane to the crucifixion. As with previous times, Elders then recorded mini-sermons in Language, to be used in Nungalinya classes (and future Bible Gardens!) for years to come.

The 2022 Art & Faith course explored the same theme, but from an artistic point of view. Some beautiful and profound artworks emerged focusing on the 'Passion' of Jesus. The college hopes, one day, to have a Scriptural 'stations of the cross' garden which will include many of these artworks.
