That They May Be One...

'I ask not only on behalf of these, but also on behalf of those who will believe in me through their word, that they may be all one.' (Jn 17: 20)

These words from Jesus' High Priestly Prayer come near the end of his final teaching discourse. Themes developed in the previous four chapters are now gathered into a sublime vision of evolving intimacy and union where all is connected, and all is well.

Yet as TS Eliot reminds us, 'Between the idea[I]/and the reality... falls the shadow'. Just look at the history of the Christian Church. We may know of congregations riven by unresolved disagreements about doctrine or behaviour. We ask: Where is the inclusiveness of Christ? Where is the love that is supposed to bear witness to a sceptical world of the reality of God's presence in our midst?

Often what we see is more about power and control springing from fear and competitiveness – more about enforcing conformity than encouraging people to become who they are meant to be in God.

The oneness that Jesus speaks of embraces diversity and can allow for conflict. I like the way Julian of Nor-

wich speaks of 'oneing' and being 'oned' into God, because this suggests a dynamic process of reconciliation. Often the discordant elements within us or within our communities need to be heard and acknowledged before they can be reconciled and healed. Transformation, healing, and integration take time, often requiring a profound shift in the way we see ourselves, God and those around us.

We need to grow in our capacity to love. I love St Paul's recommendation: 'Rather, speaking the truth in love, we are to grow up in every way into him who is the head, into Christ' (Ephes. 4:15). Yet there is the crunch, when each party thinks they know the truth. Sometimes it is hard to recognise the God or Christ the other is claiming as their authority!

Perhaps it is helpful to think about our families and communities as contexts given to us to learn how to love, and how to grow to know the One who is both Truth and Love. Then we can be agents of Love and Reconciliation in the world around us. Serendipitously, tomorrow is Reconciliation Day in Canberra!

Strong Survivor

U is a middle-aged woman who had initially reached out to SJC for

support when her daughter fell pregnant at a young age in 2020. Since then, we have provided U, her daughter, and her grandchild, with support including fresh fruit, vegetables, meat, baby formula, wipes, and nappies.

U has experienced trauma from a young age through to the present day. Despite this, she has always continued moving forward with a positive outlook and has made every effort to provide her daughter and grandchild with the type of upbringing she was never afforded herself.

In recent months, U had managed to save up enough to purchase car, and enroll in an online course, with hopes of being able to gain full-time employment – something she was very much looking forward to. SJC had supported her with book packs, and schooling supplies, and assisted her in the enrollment process – things were looking positive, and I enjoyed seeing her and hearing about the progress she was making with her course.

I was sitting at my desk early this week when I received a call from U that deeply saddened me. I listened carefully, her words interrupted by hurried breathing and sobbing.

"I am a complete mess; I feel so broken" she said. U recalled the breakdown of her relationship over the previous two weeks, and how her ex-partner became increasingly aggressive. U had suffered extreme physical abuse at the hands of this man and had ended up in hospital with 3 broken ribs, and a punctured lung. He has been apprehended and is in police custody.

Over the last two weeks, U had missed important deadlines for her online course and was unable to be contacted, missing important calls, meaning she is yet to receive her government income this fortnight. U is recovering from her injuries and is being supported by Domestic Violence Crisis Services.

As I am writing this, the volunteers are preparing several bags of groceries for U and her family. I have contacted a local pharmacy to order a few items to assist U in her recovery and will deliver them along with the food to her this afternoon. We will also work with U to get an exemption for her course and complete the necessary steps to reinstate her support payments.

I look forward to providing all our supporters with positive news regarding U's recovery in the coming months.

I read this quote some time ago: 'A touched heart means that in some way God has come.'

The church carpet was professionally cleaned a couple of weeks ago.


