SUNDAY 10 JULY 2022 FIFTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

The prophetic task: Shattering our numbness and keeping us honest

In today's reading from Amos, an animal breeder from Judah issued warnings to Israel. Amos envisioned God subjecting Israel to a test of covenantal relationships and obedience to the law, using a plumb -line against their "walls": their religious, judicial and royal institutions and practices. These no longer stood true and straight: *"I will spare them no longer"* (Amos 7:8).

It was not that the Northern Kingdom Israel was irreligious. Rather their culture had embraced rampant consumption. Luxury surrounded the elite. The poor were subjected to the insatiable demands of consumerism; the wealthy cheating in business dealings, and oppression and exploitation in daily life and the courts. Walter Brueggemann in The Prophetic Imagination argues that when dominant power permitted an economics of affluence to displace Mosaic traditions of an economics of equality; a politics of oppression to replace a politics of justice, and when God was apparently under the king's control (see pp34, 36-37), people became numb to the plight of the poor; insensitive to their suffering (see Ps 82:2-4).

To be successful in radically critiquing the dominant culture, prophets had to break through people's numbness so they could hear God's word for them: "real criticism begins in the capacity to grieve because that is the most visceral announcement that things are not right" (Brueggemann p.21). Two common ways to silence such criticism were by bloody sanctions or ignoring the prophet (Brueggemann pp37-38). Amaziah, priest of the Royal Sanctuary, attempted to silence Amos by reporting him to the king for subversion, and by highlighting his own authority in the sanctuary when ordering Amos's silence and return to Judah. When Amaziah insisted he cease prophesying or preaching, Amos, obedient to God's demands, countered with a prophetic word against Amaziah and Israel concerning exile (Amos 7:16-17). The prophetic word could not be silenced.

Jesus too radically critiqued Jewish culture. In today's gospel, a lawyer demanded "wriggle room" in obeying the heart of the law. Jesus then told the Good Samaritan parable, asking him to identify the robbed man's neighbour. He had to reply *"the one who showed him mercy"* (Luke 10:37).

Lord have mercy on us: shatter our insensitivity and numbness to those who suffer around us. Amen.

Extended isolation

St John's Care (SJC) recently received a phone call from a

woman (E) who explained that she and her two children had been in COVID-19 isolation for three weeks.

E explained that her son first contracted COVID-19. On day 6 of isolation, E tested positive, and after almost another week of isolation, her daughter tested positive.

Over the three week isolation, the family was unable to leave to do the shopping, and towards the end of their stint in isolation had almost no food left in the house. E had insufficient funds to do online grocery shopping.

The family's electricity and gas usage across the threeweek period was very high and E was concerned about her upcoming bills. They had exceeded their monthly Internet usage and were now paying fees for extra data.

"It's difficult being inside for this long, and my children miss seeing their friends and classmates. To keep them busy and connected, they share the iPad and computer for school and playing games. The children are often cold and our house is poorly insulated so we have the heater running quite regularly. I have some medication that I take daily, however, I have gone without it as we simply cannot afford it right now", she said.

The volunteers and I bagged up some fruit and vegetables, meat, dairy, non-perishables, cleaning and sanitary items and I headed to E's house to drop them off. When I arrived, I was able to get a contact number for her internet provider and pay her monthly bill for her. I gave her a referral to an energy efficiency program that provides modifications to people's homes to reduce their energy costs. I collected her scripts and picked the medication up the following day from a local pharmacy which works closely with SJC.

When I returned to the family's home to drop them to E, she broke down in tears. "I am so grateful for everything you have done for our family", she said.

Although COVID-19 does not get the same focus in the headlines as it has over the last two years, there are still many families in Canberra who are impacted by the virus every day. SJC will continue to support this family and other Canberrans who reach out to us during these difficult times.

I would like to thank everyone in the Canberra Community who donates to our organisation or supports us in the many ways you do.
