The prophetic task: To shape in our imagination alternative realities against dominant worldly paradigms and values

In today's OT reading, Amos employs another God given poetic image to open a radical critique of Israel. (Using poetry and images is characteristic of Israel's prophets.) Almost shockingly, a beautiful image of ripe summer fruit - an epitome of successful harvest and full bellies - is turned upside down to show instead an end of such bounty and the inbreaking of disaster, including famine (Amos 8:2-3,11). So, instead of praise and thanksgiving for God's gracious provisioning, Israel will break into anguished grief as doom descends on them (Amos 9-10). In uncompromising language Amos, delivering God's word, outlines a shocking, pointed social critique (Amos 4-6): a fracturing of law concerning love of neighbour dishonest business dealings, and exploitation and oppression of the poor and vulnerable, both in everyday life and in the courts. The powerful and wealthy are responsible for this disaster. Even more terrifying for a people defined by covenant, the prophetic word will be silenced in the forthcoming disaster: they shall run to and fro, seeking the word of the Lord, but they shall not find it (Amos 8:12). In the process of radical critique, the prophet must name the unconscious

or suppressed fears and terrors of the people (Brueggemann p50).

The prophet's vocation is "to keep alive the ministry of imagination, to keep on conjuring and proposing alternative realities to the single one the king wants to urge as the only thinkable one" (Brueggemann p45). In order to shape this alternative reality, God's prophetic word not only has to deliver a radical critique, but also a word of hope. Both are intrinsic to this alternative reality of the people: "it requires that we have not finally given up on the promises spoken over us by the God who is free enough to keep his promises." (Brueggemann p45). This flip from critique to hope is marked: almost shocking. Symbols or poetic images not only capture the horror of injustice and impending punishment, but also the hope of a future reconciled with God (Brueggemann p49-50). Today's Psalm shows this flip after a critique of an enemy of David's: "But I am like a green olive tree in the house of God. I trust in the steadfast love of God forever and ever" (Ps52:8).

May we join with David, praying: "I will thank you forever, because of what you have done. In the presence of the faithful I will proclaim your name because it is good" (Ps52:9).

Providing a helping hand

Last month St John's Care received a call

from a new client who we shall call N. She was asking if SJC was able to support her with financial assistance/counselling, help with her rent and utility bills, and to perhaps assist with some food and nappies.

She explained that her husband doesn't work the same hours he used to. His hours had been cut and the only car they have was currently broken down. Her husband needs the car to work and they have had to use the money set aside for paying their rent, food, and bills, to get the car fixed.

N told me that she has a 15-month-old baby and so they needed some help with nappies, wipes, and lactose free formula. She also mentioned that she needed help to buy some new winter gear for her husband. He is a painter and works mostly outdoors.

We encouraged N to come to the Centre to discuss possible solutions for her family. She came that afternoon with the aim of working together to find some temporary - but seeking permanent - solutions.

Whilst chatting with N, we agreed that SJC could offer her food (meat, fruits and vegetables) plus non-perishable food, nappies, wipes and baby food on a weekly basis. This would enable the family to save the money usually set aside for these everyday costs and pay the money they owe elsewhere.

We also made use of ActewAGL vouchers to put toward their electricity and gas bill. For the remaining outstanding amounts we contacted ActewAGL (Financial hardship Program) to obtain a payment plan to suit the family moving forward. SJC also offered N a Woolworths gift voucher so that she could buy lactose free formula for her baby.

SJC then referred her to Thread Together Clothing Hub@Vinnies. This would allow them to access the winter gear they need for N's husband to be able to continue to work.

After our conversation and all of the assistance SJC was able to give, N was extremely grateful.

Once again, we would like to thank all our supporters, your support is instrumental in enabling us to assist families within our community.
