Luke 14: 25-35

The Gospel reading for this Sunday is invariably titled the "Cost of Discipleship". Jesus is taking no prisoners in this uncompromising passage. In Aussie parlance, he is basically saying to the huge crowds that are following him; "You need to be fair dinkum." No argument there, but as we sit with the passage it raises some conundrums, some paradoxes and can seem at odds with other scriptures where, for example, we are exhorted to honour our parents. In fact, for many people, the way they follow Jesus, the expression of their faith, is through caring for loved ones or caring for the earth. So, what is the invitation of this passage?

In exploring this question, I would like to focus on the final words; "Whoever has ears to hear, let them hear." I wonder what it is that we are meant to be hearing, what are we listening to or for? Perhaps these words are an invitation to a particular stance...an open listening stance. Jesus' strong language is confronting; it's meant to shock, to get our attention. Then, the two scenarios of building a tower and going to battle, offer a way

to respond to these words – consider, weigh up, reflect on, discern. This is all part of listening.

So, we hear Jesus's call to uncompromising discipleship, we notice the invitation to weigh up, to consider the implications of that call and we listen to our lives. How do we discern what our discipleship looks like? This is where the hard work of hearing/ listening comes in. The first movement in the hearing process is to let go, let go of our attachments to things like family loyalty, reputation, security, our own ideas and so on. The second movement is one of waiting, waiting with our empty open hands. The third movement is noticing or discerning what it is that God is placing in our hands, what is God asking us to hold, to give our life to. From the place of non-attachment, we can respond to God's call open-heartedly.

Moving Forward

I was standing outside finishing a conversation with

a donor when a car parked in front of the St John's Care Centre. A woman I did not recognise, and a middle-aged woman who I knew as R and as a long-term client of ours, got out. As R got out of the car I noticed a set of crutches in her hands and a large bandage wrapped around her head. The pair approached the Centre and sat down on a bench nearby. As I walked to R, I noticed she had swelling and bruising across her face and neck.

I sat down next to R, and she instantly broke down in tears. While her concerned support worker sat with us, R began to recall the horrifying abuse she suffered at the hands of her ex-partner recently. She had lived through a bumpy relationship with him for approximately three years. After falling out, they began talking again three months ago, but this time, R's expartner was different. She suspected he was using drugs, and after finishing work one night, came home to find a syringe on the floor. R confronted him and was met with an outburst of violence and rage. She was severely beaten. Over the weeks that followed he apologised profusely, blaming his actions on the drugs that he promised not to take again. R told her friends and family about the attack but did not report the assault to police out of fear.

R returned to the house weeks later to get her belongings and was confronted and assaulted again. A neighbour contacted the police when they heard the screams, and police arrived and took the man into custody shortly after. "The drugs have completely changed him, and he is not the man I fell in love with. I can never forgive him for what he has done to me", R said.

R has been working closely with Domestic Violence Crisis Service who have been providing her with a support worker, and modifications to her home to improve safety and security. R told me that she had not been to work or the shops for weeks and had missed out on some important deadlines for a course she was studying because she was too ashamed to talk about what had happened to her.

Although R was enrolled to complete her course face-to-face, we reached out to the organisation and were able to set up for R to finish the rest of her course from home on Zoom and organised an extension on her overdue work. I gathered nonperishables, fresh fruit, vegetables, meat and cleaning supplies and helped load them into the car. As I closed the boot, R hugged me and squeezed tightly with tears rolling down her cheeks.

It is a great pleasure to be able to meet people when they are at their lowest and to be able to make a genuinely positive difference in their lives. I thank all of those in the community who support others and allow us to do the same.

We have a birthday book that we try to keep up to date, but being human sometimes we miss things. If your birthday is one of those things that we missed, please let the office know and we will add your details to the book.






Setting Up Chairs
