

Juxtaposition

There's some very interesting juxtapositions of ideas in this week's readings. In the Psalm and Lamentations we encounter the pain and humiliation of the Israelites when they are defeated, conquered and exiled. In the New Testament we see the impact of a life of simple faith, and a servanthood philosophy that expects no undue reward for living a faithful life. Is it possible that both Testaments are saying the same thing?

Often we see bad things happening to good people, and that can make it difficult to live in faith and faithfulness. It's one thing to know that the arc of the moral universe bends towards justice (thank you Revd Martin Luther King, Jr.). But it takes so long! It's very tempting to use any means, however undesirable, to achieve what we are longing for. (Looking at you, Psalmist.) But when we live out our lives in faithfulness, and pass our faith on to those who follow us, all these small, ordinary, daily acts of goodness and justice do change the world into a place where the Kingdom of Heaven is here.

It is easy to get frustrated and impatient when looking at the challenges that face our world: hunger, poverty, human rights abuses, human trafficking, disease, climate change, and more. But if we take up any strategy that gets quick results, we can easily become what we seek to overcome. As Orwell says, power corrupts. The principles that our readings encourage this week are the power of small acts of goodness and justice, and the need to think systemically and for the long term. I think here of Uncle Jack Charles, who spent much of his later life campaigning for justice. He was the first Indigenous Elder to speak at the Yoorrook Justice Commission—Victoria's Indigenous truth-telling commission. What long term commitments to justice can we embrace or renew this week?

Can we refuse to live according to the materialistic, self-centred, expedient values of the world around us? Can we live Kingdom lives, true to our heritage of faith and justice? What can we do to inspire and sustain small, long-term commitments to justice in our communities?

A new door opens

Earlier this week, we received a visit from a long-term client. P is a middle-

aged woman and has been at risk of homelessness for several years. Over the past 18 months, she has been staying at a woman's refuge.

During this time, P has regularly visited the Centre for food support and, with the food we have provided her, has run cooking classes within the refuge for other women. During her visits to SJC she often showed us photos of the delicious meals she had prepared. P has referred many of the women she lived with to our service, and over the past two years we have formed a relationship with those we have supported.

When P visited this week, her demeanor was even more upbeat than usual. "They have found me a house to live in! Robbie, I really cannot believe it, but they have found me a house, I am almost lost for words", she said. Tears of joy streamed down her face as she shook her head slowly in bewilderment, sipping her tea occasionally. It was clear how much this moment meant to P, and I felt incredibly proud of how she had persevered for so long in the face of adversity.

We got together some bowls, plates, cutlery, and other kitchen utensils for P's new place. We also gathered blankets, sheets, and pillows to make a bedding pack, and some fresh new towels which had kindly been donated.

P asked me if she could visit the Centre weekly for the next month, as she was required to pay a bond, and two weeks of rent upfront prior to moving in. Although she had covered most of the bond, there was still two weeks of rent to find, and this was due. P was concerned that if she was not able to come up with the money, she would lose the opportunity and someone else would take her spot.

I contacted the relevant housing agency, and St John's Care helped her cover the rent and the remainder of the bond owed. We gathered a few large bags of fresh fruit and veg, dairy, bread, meat, and non-perishables, and I helped take them to her car.

As we loaded the groceries into her boot, P thanked me for everything our organisation has done to support her and the other women who lived at the refuge. She emphasized how big of an impact the support had made in their lives, and that she would continue to work with disadvantaged members of the community to bring positive change.

I look forward to seeing P over the coming months and am eager to hear about the next chapter in her life.
