

Keeping perspective (Psalm 119.97-104)

It's easy to lose perspective when we're feeling tired, hurt, lonely or afraid. In this state our world shrinks; life becomes a matter of surviving more than thriving.

Today's Psalm draws our eye away from predicament and towards God's presence.

A feature of Hebrew poetry is its parallelism. This is where an idea is expressed in two balancing parts. The first introduces the topic while the second restates, extends or offers a contrast. The contrast drawn in today's Psalm is between God's word and our response. Each verse builds and enhances what God's word means to us, intellectually, socially, ethically and emotionally as the pronouns move rhythmically from 'you' to 'me'.

God's law may not be something we love, nor is it always something on which we meditate or reflect slowly. To us, the law sounds foreign and harsh being little more than a long list of prohibitions. God's Torah or law is the first five books associated with Moses, everything from Genesis to Deuteronomy. There's drama and story, poetry and genealogies, instructions and commandments. All of it is a delight to the Psalmist.

They present an idealised vision of how God's people could and should have lived with God. The hope that exists even now seeps out of the story by which the people's foundations are told. The glory and shame of each generation is observed. The heartache, longing and disappointments are

recounted alongside the joys, wonders and mountain top experiences. The people yearn, listen, grow deaf and are reminded again and again about God's goodness.

God speaks to those who want to hear and are open. This voice brings wisdom and understanding, teaching and delight. Such words enable someone to grow and be capable of discerning wise and sensible ways from those that are false and destructive.

Anglicans can struggle with this vision because we fail to appreciate what's involved with meditating on God's law. Leaders suggest that obedience to law is what matters most. While the Psalmist follows God's precepts, such action is the result of chewing on God's character more than blindly following ancient requirements that barely fit today's world. If you want to see how ridiculous the literal approach can be, just read A.J. Jacobs, *The year of living biblically* (2008).

The word translated as meditate means to mutter or murmur because in the ancient world there was no such thing as reading silently or privately. Reading aloud is the first step for thinking aloud. For the rabbis it involved arguing, grappling, contending and even shouting at God and each other. None of this polite indifference that Anglicans are famous for!

The greatest gift we have are these 66 books printed on paper and bound in leather. It is a story that confounds intellectuals, worries tyrants, and upended our world several times over. Read it, meditate on it, argue with it. You might not live the same way again. Wayne Brighton



A Broken Family

L had lived with her partner W, and their daughter U, for 11 years.

About two years ago W lost his job due to COVID-19, and his mental health began to deteriorate. "He was sitting at home just drinking all day, and I could see the frustration and anger building up inside of him. He was becoming a different person and would snap if I was home later than normal or if the house wasn't clean. I would get in my car after work and know that if I was late, I was in trouble", L explained.

W's angry outbursts began as verbal abuse, but escalated. U walked home from school every afternoon and would often go straight to her room to avoid any attention from her father. One afternoon L finished work late and returned home to a quiet house. She went to the kitchen to make dinner, but as she did so, she was confronted by W. He pinned her against the wall and struck her repeatedly. Hearing the commotion from outside her room, U came to the kitchen to see her father beating her mother.

L knew she had to escape but was concerned for the safety of both her and her daughter. A few days later after returning home from work, L found U badly beaten in her bedroom U told her mother that she thought she was going to be killed. The pair waited until W passed out, and left that night, seeking refuge at L's colleague's house. They reported the abusive incidents to police and contacted DVCS for support.

DVCS are supporting the family with finding safe accommodation. We provided L and U with plenty of fresh food, school snacks and school supplies (new backpack, books, pencil case and stationery). We also paid for the family's prescriptions and provided them with a bus card so that U could travel from her new home to her new school. We will continue to work closely with L and U and will advocate on their behalf to ensure they have a positive future, and ultimately feel safe.

There are many things we take for granted – food, warmth, shelter and even a sense of safety. Thank you to our donors, volunteers, and supporters for bringing a sense of safety back into this family's life.

30th Anniversary of the Ordination of Women in the Anglican Church

2022 is a very significant year in the history of women's ordination in the Anglican Church. It has been 30 years since the first women were ordained to the priesthood in the Anglican Diocese of Perth on the 7th of March, 1992. This was followed by the ordination of eleven women from the Diocese of Canberra and Goulburn on the 23rd of December 1992. These eleven women were those who had previously been 'turned back at the post' on February 2nd, due to a court injunction.

The Anglican Diocese of Canberra and Goulburn is hosting a diocesan service of celebration to mark

the 30th anniversary of the ordination of women, which will be held in St Saviour's Cathedral, Goulburn, on the 5th of November at 2.00 pm. The preacher will be Bishop Genieve Blackwell, from the Diocese of Melbourne.

Our first women priests in this diocese travelled a difficult road to fulfil their call. We recognise the pain of that journey, but also the great gift they gave our diocese as they have continued to

serve with wisdom and grace. We greatly value the legacy they created which continues to encourage women who feel called to the priesthood to pursue their call. It is fitting that we celebrate their ministry to us in a diocesan Eucharist.

At Holy Covenant, we note that many of the first eleven ordained in our Diocese are known to us personally as members of our church family. Our thanks to Anne Dudzinski, Elaine Gifford and Ruth Dudley for their determination to follow God's call on their lives, and for their loyal service to the church in the 30 years since their ordination. We also recognise Susanna Pain, who was ordained in Adelaide two weeks earlier.


