Dreams and Prophecies (Joel 2:23-32)

SUNDAY 23 OCTOBER 2022

TWENTIETH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

It's difficult to be positive about the opening verse of this reading, isn't it? It feels like most of the Australian east coast is over "abundant rain". But let's move past that challenge.

This is the section of Joel that Peter preached from at the first Pentecost. The opening verses are designed to encourage the Israelites (and us) to live in expectation and hope. God's people will not always languish in exile and hardship; there will be joy and abundance.

I want to focus our attention on verses 28-29:

Then afterward I will pour out my spirit on all flesh; your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, your old men shall dream dreams, and your young men shall see visions. Even on the male and female slaves, in those days, I will pour out my spirit

Gosh that's radical stuff.

The book of Joel was written sometime around 350BC. That long ago, women were prophesying. That long ago, people outside the power structures of the day (i.e. women and slaves) were filled with the Holy Spirit. And yet, it was only 30 years ago that the first women were ordained in the Anglican Church of Australia. I suspect that the number of people from outside the power structures of today (e.g. refugees, people with disability, LGBTIAQ+ people) who have been ordained in the Anglican Church of Australia remains low.

To quote Carl Gregg "this is not an abstract, theoretical debate". Words

and actions matter; people from minority groups are facing discrimination and harassment in their everyday lives. The recent hearings of the Disability Royal Commission provide ample evidence of that.

The suffrage exhibition at Parliament House celebrates the 120th anniversary of the Commonwealth Franchise Act 1902, which gave most women the right to vote in Australian elections. Not all, but most. That status quo needed to be challenged, to ensure that Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders could also vote.

The church needs to be a place where people are celebrated for who they are, and where everyone has the opportunity to use the gifts that the Spirit provides. If the church actively discourages women, people of colour, people with disability or LGBTIAQ+ people, or fails to model leadership from people in those groups, we are potentially a part of blocking people from hearing God's call.

The ordination of women was a step forward in the life of the Anglican church. We can imagine yet more, where people from other groups outside our current power structures can be empowered to answer God's call on their lives. As St. Augustine famously said, "Hope has two beautiful daughters: anger and courage. Anger that things are the way they are. Courage to make them the way they ought to be."

If the church is to fulfil the promise of Joel's prophecy in verses 28-29, then who should we ordain? And why?

Mental Illness is not Failure

V has been in Canberra for about seven years

and to this day had not returned to his family overseas. Five years ago he got married and has two children with his wife. About a year after their marriage, things started getting complicated. V has experienced physical, emotional, and psychological abuse including social isolation and dominating behaviour from his wife. V feels ashamed and at fault for not doing anything to improve his situation.

The last episode of violence happened a fortnight ago, when his wife told him if he didn't leave immediately, she was going to physically force him out. At the time he didn't know what to do and he didn't know where he could go. Not wanting his children to witness a bad scene, he opted to leave immediately. That night he slept in a park which was the worst night of his life. The next day he went to the police to ask for help.

The police offered him a temporary stay for three days and offered him mental help support. He applied for Centrelink support because he can't sleep, is unable to concentrate and is constantly having bad thoughts. He is ashamed to go through this experience and feels like a complete failure.

V recently found a room in a house. After rent he is left with \$50. He asked for help with transport and SJC provided an Action bus card (with credit) so that he could get around town for the next four weeks. We also contributed bedding, pillows, towels, toiletries. and some food bank vouchers.

V is following a Mental Health program developed by his GP. I invited him to come to the Centre whenever he needs to talk to someone and provided information about Head to Health and Safe Haven Belconnen. No appointment is needed for either, and services are free.

V felt happier and more relaxed after he received this assistance. He will do everything he can to improve his mental health, so he is able to move forward and gain employment. V expressed his sincere thanks to all the donors, volunteers and staff who are involved in providing this high level of support and assistance to those in the community who need it most.


A National Act of Recognition with the First Peoples of Australia is about to begin.

30th Anniversary of the Ordination of Women in the Anglican Church

2022 is a very significant year in the history of women's ordination in the Anglican Church. It has been 30 years since the first women were ordained to the priesthood in the Anglican Diocese of Perth on the 7th of March, 1992. This was followed by the ordination of eleven women from the Diocese of Canberra and Goulburn on the 23rd of December 1992. These eleven women were those who had previously been 'turned back at the post' on February 2nd, due to a court injunction.

The Anglican Diocese of Canberra and Goulburn is hosting a diocesan service of celebration to mark

the 30th anniversary of the ordination of women, which will be held in St Saviour's Cathedral, Goulburn, on the 5th of November at 2.00 pm. The preacher will be Bishop Genieve Blackwell, from the Diocese of Melbourne.

Our first women priests in this diocese travelled a difficult road to fulfil their call. We recognise the pain of that journey, but also the great gift they gave our diocese as they have continued to serve with wisdom and grace. We greatly value the legacy they created which continues to encourage women who feel called to the priesthood to pursue their call. It is fitting that we celebrate their ministry to us in a diocesan Eucharist.

At Holy Covenant, we note that many of the first eleven ordained in our Diocese are known to us personally as members of our church family. Our thanks to Anne Dudzinski, Elaine Gifford and Ruth Dudley for their determination to follow God's call on their lives, and for their loyal service to the church in the 30 years since their ordination. We also recognise Susanna Pain, who was ordained in Adelaide two weeks earlier.


