A call to faithfulness

Jesus is often radical, disturbing and confronting. He honours the poor and inverts normal notions of charity. The poor widow's meagre offerings are worth more than the gifts of the rich. Jesus says this because her meagre offerings express more faith. Jesus honours and privileges the "least" and deprivileges grand and obvious expressions of power. The great Temple was a majestic structure that expressed Herod's wealth and civic generosity. It was a beautiful and inspired devotion. However for Jesus the visible richness of the Temple is a teaching device, cautioning listeners against putting their trust in false hopes and limited powers. Don't trust in beauty or apparent devotion. Don't trust the signs of success in this world. Even the great Temple will not last.

Jesus also warns against false prophets. Speaking with authority is not enough. Prophets need to reflect the values of Jesus as displayed in his ministry. What is so disturbing yet comforting in the Gospel reading (Luke 21: 5-19) is that the prophecy of the destruction of the Temple (70CE) was not evidence of God's rejection and disfavour, but was in fact the fulfillment of God's plan. Rather than injecting anxiety, Luke argues this disaster should instill expectation and hope. What might

bring terror should result in trust. God is still in charge. God is faithful and we should remain faithful.

Jesus describes a somewhat terrifying picture of persecution. Yet this was designed to inspire hope and trust. The early Church endured focused persecution under Roman Emperors and Governors, who sought to undermine Christian testimony about the supremacy of Christ. Yet persecution and humiliation is not a cue for discouragement but an opportunity for confession of God's kingdom. The book of Acts is full of stories of the power of God to transform difficult situations and give "Words and wisdom". Tertullian wrote "the blood of martyrs is the seed of the church".

How then do we interpret the assurance about "not a hair of your head will perish" with the statements about being put to death? We need to look at the Cross. Death is not end. As Paul says in 1 Corinthians 15:54 Death has been swallowed up in victory. There is more to this story than the world knows and much more activity by God than we realise.

The emphasis in our reading today is on faithfulness. We are to trust, and in trusting we are to live with faithfulness. Redemption is drawing near but it takes eyes of faith to see and hearts of hope to trust.

A botched relocation

J is a single woman in her 70's who is reliant on the age pension. English is J's

second language, and she was referred to St John's Care (SJC) after she had not eaten in two days.

SJC provided J with food. Assisting our clients with food helps them reallocate money towards bills and other essentials. It can also serve as a gateway to discussing a client's situation in more depth.

J advised that she had recently been relocated by Housing ACT to a new property. Unfortunately the removalists engaged by Housing ACT were abusive towards her and refused to place her furniture in the locations she requested. The removalists left her belongings dumped throughout the house in walkways, the bathroom - so that she cannot use her shower - and blocking access to her kitchen. The removalists also damaged items including the washing machine.

J has recently undergone surgery and uses mobility aids. J has had several falls and is struggling to safely move around her home. J is unable to move the items to where she needs them to be. She is taking heavy loads of washing to the local laundromat on foot due to the damaged washing machine. This is not assisting her recovery from surgery.

I assisted J to make a complaint to ACT Housing. Together we advocated for a Housing ACT Manager to attend J's property and hear her story. We also made a complaint about J's treatment by the removalists.

While the outcome from this meeting is pending, we hope that support will be provided to J with the location of her belongings, and financial compensation for the damage. We will also be working with My Aged Care to ensure that J has the correct level of support that she needs to remain in her home for as long as possible.

J expressed her sincere gratitude for the assistance that St John's Care has provided her.

Truth Telling—the Recognition Way

On 29 October, 87 people gathered at Kamay Botany Bay for the inaugural gathering of A National Act of Recognition.

There was truth telling—we brought early factual records that revealed our colonizing past into the open, and placed those records under public scrutiny.

We created a platform for the Voice of First Nations Peoples to be heard, as we listened to them speak freely about their experience of the impact of colonising actions on them and their people.

We created a platform for the Voice of all Australians of goodwill who labour to make wrong things right—for their voice to be heard alongside First Nations Peoples.

I came away with a sense that many of us felt we had taken a first step towards a great weight, a dark cloud being lifted from our nation. There was an air, an experience of being liberated, of being set free.

Although we spent the day naming and speaking to painful and ugly realities, we were brought closer

to each other. This closeness was based on a truth that binds us together—the truth of our common humanity. We are all brothers and sisters, and at Kamay that day it felt that we were all wanting to take care of each other the way brothers and sisters should.

Our heartfelt thanks to all who made Saturday 29 October possible. Some of you worked for weeks to make it happen. Some of you were present on the day. Others were not able to be. But we know who you are, and we want you to know you are the unseen heroes of Truth Telling – The Recognition Way.

And the next step? Recognition is a gift that belongs to everyone – with no one left out. Hence our next gathering will be open to all Australians. And we will replicate all the above – with tens of thousands present.

We will be delighted if you are one of them.
