The reign of Christ

The Gospel reading from Luke 23: 33 -43 is the story of Jesus' crucifixion. This was death by torture; Rome was asserting its power. Crucifixion symbolised not just death but carried with it the dehumanising of the person being crucified. Power's ultimate authority was declared.

What is Jesus' reaction to this appalling torture and indignity? He prays. He affirms his identity before God and others. He continues to love and intercede on behalf of his accusers. In contrast the Roman soldiers cast lots for Jesus' clothing, reflecting the prediction of Psalm 22:18 They divided my clothes among them and cast lots for my garments. The religious are described as exulting in their victory over Jesus. The Roman soldiers join in mocking him. They offer sour wine, part of the process of ridicule. The sign put over his head This is the King of the Jews is meant to be ironic.

And yet, a criminal both defends Jesus and understands his mission. This man recognises the justice of his own position and upholds the innocence of Jesus. Here a marginalised felon recognises who Jesus is. Jesus receives this man's confession with a message of hope. He offers grace and forgiveness. Jesus humanizes and personalises the situation—You will be with me. Rather than being cursed by being hung on a pole (Numbers 21:8-9) Jesus is able to remove the curse of death. God's salvation is found in the crisis. God does not need the systems of the world to provide salvation. God is our refuge and strength. God works in the face of utter trauma, and brings salvation in times of despair. God can be trusted when things are at their worst.

The reign of Christ is also the theme of the reading from Colossians 1: 11-20. Prior to creation it is Christ through whom and for whom all things are created and in whom they find their unity and coherence. It is in the humiliating death of Jesus that God reconciles all things to himself, whether on earth or in heaven by making peace through the blood of the cross.

Both Luke and the writer of Colossians see God's reign accomplished in what humanly appears the opposite. The reign of God comes in the shape of the Cross. The redemption wrought in Jesus Christ has cosmic significance in Colossians. Paul's Christological images powerfully emphasise the cosmic significance of Christ. For in him all the fullness of God was pleased to reconcile to himself all things, whether on earth or in heaven, by making peace through the blood of the Cross.

Fight for Family

H is a long-term St John's Care (SJC) client who has regularly accessed our services over

several years. She is a single mother, looking after her four children whilst navigating through the long and exhausting legal process of gaining sole legal custody of her children, and financial support from her ex-partner.

Significant rises in the cost of food, petrol, utilities, and medical bills have impacted the family over the last twelve months. Despite some savvy financial planning and management, the simple truth is that the costs of raising a family of five heavily exceeds H's income.

When H first approached me approximately a year ago, she had discovered that she did not have the funds necessary to obtain legal representation. I was able to refer her to a free legal service which specialises in family law. After a thorough discussion about the family's financial situation, we agreed to support them on a more regular basis.

H regularly visited SJC for assistance with printing, sorting, and sending off her legal documents, but more importantly, someone to debrief and talk to. We spent hours discussing each court visit at length, talking about her hope of having her children in her care full time and the life she hoped to provide for them one day.

Yesterday, she came to SJC with a big smile on her face, and a thick stack of papers in her hands. As I walked over to greet her, she hugged me. We sat down and she handed me the papers she had been provided by the court. She now has full custody of her children, as well as financial support from her ex-partner.

It has been incredible to watch H dedicate herself entirely to ensuring the best possible outcome for her children, and to finally see some positive and encouraging results. Her constant battle to provide the best for her children despite the adversities she faces serves as a great reminder of the insignificances of my own daily anxieties and concerns.

We will continue to support H and her children over the coming months, and have booked them in to receive Christmas gifts, and a Christmas hamper from SJC in December. Thank you for all of those who continue to make contributions to our organisation in some way – we truly are grateful.



Aged Care Volunteers Needed


Could you find one hour a week (Monday to Friday) to make someone's day better? Commit to doing it regularly?

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
