Advent 1: Expectation and hope

We look forward to Christmas. As a child it is an exciting time of expectation. Presents, special meals, family celebrations, holidays, warm summer weather. But do we look forward to the final goal of history? That is the theme of today's readings—eschatology in theological language.

The end times have been a focus for many with the Left Behind series selling 65 million copies. However Jurgen Moltmann's Theology of Hope is a very different book. Moltmann's objective was to rescue eschatology from fringe fanatics and place it at the centre of Christianity. At its essence eschatology is about hope—forward looking and forward moving. God leads the way. But we cannot be complacent about the present. As Moltmann says "Faith when it develops into hope causes not rest, but unrest, not patience but impatience. It does not calm the unquiet heart but is itself the unquiet heart within us. Those who hope in Christ can no longer put up with reality as it is, but begin to suffer under it, to contradict it."

So we should be impatient for justice, fairness, equality, peace, and the common good. History is moving towards God's goal of the reconciliation of all things. We should be a "constant disturbance in human society, the source of continued new impulses toward the

realisation of righteousness, freedom and humanity here, in the light of the future that is to come."

Victor Frankl concluded in Man's Search for Meaning that the Holocaust prisoners who survived were those who did not sink into despair but lived in hope: "Only those who were oriented towards the future, towards a goal in the future, towards a meaning to fulfil in the future were likely to survive."

In the Gospel reading today, Jesus reminds us of the world at the time of Noah. People were focused on their earthly concerns; they were preoccupied by the events of the world, oblivious to the more important issues of life, purpose and the divine. Their relationship with God had been neglected. This all consuming emphasis on earthly existence was seen as wickedness in the eyes of God.

Jesus goes on to exhort us to be watchful. We cannot predict when Jesus will return, but we need to be prepared and vigilant. How do we do this? Matthew makes clear: we feed the hungry, clothe the naked, support the homeless, side with the marginalised, support those with disability. The Parousia will come, but we do not know when. However we can prepare by ensuring our relationship with God is right and we are living out what that means in our lives and work.

Navigating recovery

S has one preschool aged child, with whom she currently lives. A year ago, S

and her child fled their family home following a violent incident between herself and her now expartner, G. G had been violent towards her for some years. However, the violence had escalated significantly during the COVID-19 pandemic lockdowns when he was out of work and the family was experiencing both financial and housing stress.

At the time, both S and G were surviving on Job Seeker payments and a Carer's pension. The couple had barely enough money to pay for their rent, food, and utility bills, and had no savings.

Since leaving G, S received transitional housing via a supported accommodation service. The supported accommodation service referred S to SJC as, with the high cost of living, she was struggling to pay for her bills (especially childcare), and food.

SJC supported S with advocacy to Housing ACT for her to be placed on the Priority Housing waiting list. We also helped with bills, regular food assistance and emotional support. Recently, S had a motor vehicle accident and had to pay the excess for her insurance. This amount set her back considerably at a time in her life when she is still financially very vulnerable.

This week, we are pleased to advise that S has received an offer of priority housing from Housing ACT. As a result of this offer, SJC has been supporting S with advocacy to both the Housing ACT and Domestic Violence Crisis Services to assist with her relocation expenses as she does not have the funds to pay for a removal truck herself.

Despite all that has happened in her life, S feels incredibly lucky to have her family to support her, as well as having organisations like St John's Care who have come to her aid where others cannot. Thank you to all who continue to make contributions to SJC in some way – we truly are grateful.

Eggs were broken in the egg & spoon race. Tossing and catching marshmallows proved quite amusing.






