Politics and Palms

There are many Christians who decry the commercialisation and secularisation of Christmas and Easter. But at the same time, most of us participate in the consumerism and cultural complacency that both these festivals are supposed to challenge. This happens with Palm Sunday as well.

It's very easy to get caught up in the marching, and the singing, and the waving of vegetation and forget the point of the original Palm Sunday. That day was deeply political. But to understand the key symbol in that political act, we need to go back further in Bible history.

After God delivered the Israelites from slavery in Egypt, the palm tree and its branches became an important symbol of victory for Israel. After Israel escaped from Egypt, the Lord commanded that they hold a feast to commemorate their freedom from those who had enslaved them for hundreds of years.

From then on, the Israelites observed the Feast of Tabernacles, which lasted seven days. Throughout this period, the Israelites lived in booths made of

palm branches, leafy tree boughs, and brook willows (Leviticus 23:40–43). During the Feast of Tabernacles, palm branches were always carried.

Those palm branches waving in the streets of Jerusalem on the first Palm Sunday were symbolic of Jewish freedom from captivity, slavery and oppression. Laying palm branches down for Jesus to ride over says "We want to be free. Jesus is going to bring change, and restore what was lost." What a threat that is to the Roman occupiers and those collaborating with them!

Palm Sunday is possibly the most political Sunday of the year. As Bo Sanders states, "it is a call for revolution against the powers of oppression, the systems and institutions that occupy foreign lands and repress its citizens with unjust practices and economic policies."

What re-positioning do we have to do, to be true to the original intent of Palm Sunday? How should we respond to injustice, occupation, the politics of empire, and economic policies of oppression?

A SECOND CHANCE IN LIFE

When we were delivering Christmas hampers last year, I met a person who wanted

to know what services St John's Care (SJC) offers to the community. P told me he would be back soon because he really needs help making improvements in his life.

P came looking for me yesterday and summarised many memorable experiences both good and bad. He told me that his life had been full of excuses and some bad decisions which were now affecting his health.

P explained how he was married and told me that he was never a good husband or a good father. In fact, he was blinded by excuses for so long that he lost his family. After that he suffered two strokes and now has difficulty getting around. He takes medication daily, and working is near impossible.

This year P has started to share custody of his three children (every other week). He is trying to do the best he can to improve life for himself and his children. He is trying to lead a much healthier life, as his children are still young and need him by their side.

P and I had a conversation about how St John's Care could help him. One of the goals we identified was to improve his standard of living and that of his children. As he takes a lot of medicine, he suggested that it would be great if SJC could help him with his scripts. I agreed to help him with the scripts once a month, and agreed to provide him with food, especially school snacks, on the weeks when he has his children. We also talked about how to prepare healthy meals. I printed out some helpful information as well as some ideas about using the food which SJC provides.

P was super happy and told me that by receiving this help, he would be able to pay his rent and utility bills. One of his main concerns was the expense of grocery shopping when caring for his children. With the money he receives from Centrelink, he cannot cover his expenses. Getting help from St John's Care means he doesn't have to worry too much about how to stretch his income. Receiving help with food and healthy eating ideas will assist in improving his everyday life.

He was very grateful, and a smile appeared on his face. "Now I will try to be the person and the father that my children deserve and thanks to all of you I will achieve it", he said before saying goodbye.

I would like to thank the donors, supporters and volunteers who have contributed to our organisation, and who have played a part in supporting people like P.

Learning to Engage

Learning to Engage is an article Revd Wayne wrote for the St James Institute. We will be serialising the article over the next few editions of the Weekly Bulletin.

What might at 22nd Century historian make of present day Australian Christianity? How would they explain the many efforts used to engage a changing nation since the 1960s?

One pattern I've noticed could be called focus, forms and formation. The conversation has come almost full circle with a renewed focus on the nature of Christian identity. Who we are as Christians grows from the vision of discipleship that is anchored in how Scripture is read, the gospel is understood, and what engagement with the world is expected or desired.

Focus, forms, formation

The story told by Christians about Christianity in Australia since the 1960s has been one of perpetual decline. Falling religious affiliation and diminished congregational participation prompted leaders to focus on the nature of Christian identity in a changing world.

During the 1970s, the Evangelical answer was to focus on communicating the gospel to cut through growing secularisation. Pentecostals longed for the Holy Spirit to bring a supernatural revival. By the 1980s, progressives yearned for a genuinely Australian church that would help the nation look beyond its British horizon.

Not everyone wanted what these groups had to offer. Old divisions deepened as groups competed for institutional power.

The conversation shifted through the 1990s and 2000s to how new forms of church might emerge, particularly as traditional structures proved resistant. More flexible structures and better strategies were championed with church planting gaining dominance because new woold was said to produce

the most fruit. Yet this strategy had its problems too. Much of the new work was simply reporting old things with a multi-million dollar price tag. Imported techniques trumped patient cultural work that would make for more effective contextualisation.

The conversation shifted again during the 2010s as church planting began to fall short of expectations. People not structures was the key, with better formation being the answer. A different breed of leaders were needed. Men who had extroverted personalities and skills attuned to converting unbelievers rather than sustaining parishes. Yet every minister would not be a missionary.. Leadership continued to be a matter of imitation, not investigation. Many of those who built prominent ministries were shown to be bullies, while the planters they inspired often chafed against any oversight or collaborative endeavour.

Those that notice this movement from focus, forms and formation contend that it all grows from the soil of discipleship cultivated underneath.

At least two streams have become evident, offerning competing and contrasting visions for discipleship today.


