# Applying the Resurrection

"For the promise is for you, for your children, and for all who are far away, everyone whom the Lord our God calls to him " (Acts 2:39)

This is incredibly powerful stuff. But only if we respond to it as Peter invites us to do, by living lives of love towards one another. If all we do is read the words and fail to apply them to the realities of the world that we live in, then are we really living lives of love?

Applying the resurrection means participating in what God is doing in the world in all sorts of ways. In times of natural disasters, we apply the resurrection in our response through prayer, financial support, or physically engaging in the support of those affected. When the planet is threatened by climate change and out of control consumerism, we apply the resurrection in our actions to control our own environmental footprint, supporting those working for change at all levels, and finding ways to help those directly

impacted by rising sea levels and changing temperatures.

We apply the resurrection through prayer, contribution, volunteering or voting. We watch what God is already doing, and we respond. Of course, we can choose to do nothing, or do our own thing. These are both responses. But are they responses that demonstrate lives of love towards ourselves and others?

I try to look at the questions that can divide the church through this lens of applying the resurrection. How do opportunities such as the Voice, or legislation on Voluntary Assisted Dying (VAD) provide opportunities for us to apply the resurrection, to live lives of love for others?

For me, both the Voice and VAD require me to consider the greater good first and foremost. Do both these concepts provide opportunities for the world to be a better place for those who are currently suffering or experiencing disadvantage? Does my support for both show love to others? I think the answer is yes.

# Rebuilding

Last month the Multicultural Hub referred

a client. We will call the client T. T does not speak English, but fortunately I speak Spanish.

T told me how and why she had come to Australia. The reasons why T fled her country are based around fear and trauma. She now lives with a kindhearted family who offered her a room, but she has no money to buy food or to put towards her room.

Due to the conditions of her visa - which is a month away from expiring - she cannot work in this country. This means she will have to return to her own country. At the mere mention of this, I could hear the fear and panic in her voice.

I contacted Legal Aid to see if they could help with T's visa or provide any immigration advice. We were able to get an appointment that same afternoon. I accompanied T to help her with the translation. One of the Legal Aid workers explained that her experiences and the traumatic effects of those experiences could mean she is eligible for a different type of visa. Legal Aid is going to help with the whole visa application process.

The other impact of T's trauma is that she cannot sleep, has panic attacks, anxiety, and stress. T and I arranged to meet at 'Head to Health' the next day. 'Head to Health' offered T some strategies on how to identify and manage anxiety and stress. They also agreed to work with St John's Care (SJC) on T's case.

SJC will assist T in obtaining food on a weekly basis until her immigration status improves and she is able to work. We can also help her with some bus tickets so that she can get around. We invited T to visit us whenever she needs to talk to someone and informed her about our monthly lunch, which is a very good opportunity to get to know what is going on in our community.



# **Hearing the Voice**

Australians will soon be asked to vote to enshrine an Indigenous voice in our nation's constitution.



Many communities will need lots of help if they

are to understand, engage and support the referendum. This training event is for local people who wish to travel with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people and to see this vital initiative succeed. Participants will:

- 1. explore the history and significance of the Uluru Statement from the Heart
- 2. understand why including the Voice in the Constitution matters
- 3. appreciate how the Voice could improve life in local communities for First Nations people
- 4. gain confidence and know-how in leading local conversations with friends, families and communities
- 5. reflect theologically with Christians from a range of perspectives about the Voice's importance.

Morning tea will provided. Participants are advise that lunch will not be provided as there are many cafes in the vicinity providing a range of options.

This event will be facilitated by the Revd Canon A/Prof. Glenn Loughrey.

Glenn is a Wiradjuri man. He is a leader at the Crawford School of Public Policy at the Australian National University in Canberra and the Anglican Diocese of Melbourne's Educator and Advocate for the Voice. He is the chairperson of the National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Anglican Council, the vicar of St Oswald's in Glen Iris and artist in residence at St Paul's Anglican Cathedral in Melbourne.

# **Learning to Engage—Part Three**

Learning to Engage is an article Revd Wayne wrote for the St James Institute. Previously, we explored the history of Australian Christianity since the

1960s, discipleship as control, and introduced discipleship as discovery. This is the final instalment in this se-

ries.



The gospel is pattern to be known and emulated for as the Father sent Jesus to a beloved yet estranged world, so Christians are sent to make God's love evident and effective. Faith, hope and love are discovered by learning how to see and engage as Jesus did. The point of Jesus is not to rescue the faithful by enabling them to escape or even to dominate the world, but to recreate the world by teaching people how to love deeply and appropriately. Christians are then invited to join, share and build God's kingdom of love, mercy, compassion and justice in this world.

Christ's life is like a blood transfusion that enters our bloodstream and enables us to see everything with eyes of faith, hope and love. Discipleship becomes the process or means by which we walk the way of love with Jesus, moving from sin into salvation, from isolation into community, violence into love, outsiders into insiders, dominion into harmony and temporality into eternity.

Discipleship is a perplexing path even when discovery is emphasised. For new life emerges only by asking questions, replying honestly and walking a new way. Our experience of life may be confusing and unstable, but our resistance, disappointment, struggle and weakness present opportunities for growth with God's help. Perhaps the greatest discovery is that we are not alone. God's kingdom and the desire for belonging, safety and prosperity beat within everyone for all are beloved.

Christian engagement with the world is transformed when equality is discovered. Difference, diversity and even dissent are valued as Christians participate in the work of recreation by addressing the injustice, violence and desecration that are simply taken as normal. When Christians become responsible, creative and non-violent citizens of God's kingdom, they may well become people who are respected, trusted and supported by those beyond our ecclesial borders.

Engaging with discovery can be problematic. Asking questions can make life awkward. Criticism can become an excuse for inaction. Collaboration can cause us to lose perspective and to drift from our core values. What's more, it takes energy to be curious. It takes courage to be present. It takes patience and forgiveness to be creative, all of which are in short supply. When discipleship is about discovery, Jesus shifts from being our master to a friend, companion and guide who enables us to leave our isolation and destruction behind for a better world.

#### Conclusion

Current efforts to refocus the church's understanding of discipleship will have long-term consequences that may not be evident now. Each pathway will give rise to new ecclesial forms and expectations about leadership formation. Although each pathway will struggle with the other, as Esau and Jacob did long ago, I take heart from Jesus' parable of the seed that grows by itself (Mark 4: 26-29).

I have chosen to walk the pathway of discovery and by doing so turn away from trying to control the discipleship of others. The gospel seed is spread trusting that whatever stalk, head and grain emerges will be what's needed. Maybe the future of the church will grow best when people learn to love those that they live with and let God take care of the rest.

## Scam Alert!

There are scams circulating at present that we encourage our Holy Covenant family to avoid:

- 1. A text message is sent to your mobile phone – purporting to be from your son or daughter. The texts claims the phone has been dropped in the loo and tells you to save the new temporary mobile number. The damaged phone's been put in rice, but in the meantime there is no access to the online banking system. There's an urgent bill needing to be paid, the amount of the 'supposed' bill is sent, and you're asked if that's OK. A further text asks "Can you help me?" question? On confirmation that the amount is OK Bank details including BSB & A/c no. and name are sent; your asked to do a mobile transfer (i.e. via Osko.) The language used mimics that of a son or daughter seeking help from their Mum or Dad.
- 2. An email purporting to be from Revd Wayne. There are several fake addresses, including pastor8329@gmail.com, rector.holycovenant.au@gmail.com and other variations on those themes. Rest assured that Revd Wayne will never ask you for money, or for you to send him gift cards, or phrase a request like this: "Are you available to spare me some of your time now? Kindly respond to this email."

Both 'Art & Faith' and 'Faith & Family Wellbeing' courses continue to prove very popular with students, and combine the learning of specific skills (drawing & painting and grief, trauma, violence-prevention strategies), within a Christian worldview. These 'applied ministries' are vital in community where such issues are so dominant. Please keep praying for these students as often deep emotions and cultural practices are being considered and worked through.
