God's Story, Episode 4 Pentecost

Have you ever noticed how Christians tell God's story, which they sometimes call the Gospel? Typically, they present it in four parts: creation – fall – redemption – judgment. The Gospel, thanks to Sam Wells, is better seen as a five-part drama: creation – Israel – Jesus – church – the eschaton or the end. This version emphasises the promise of invitation rather than the threat of destruction.

Creation is the ongoing presence of God in our world.

Israel is the invitation to humanity to live as part of creation. Like our namesake, we wrestle with our true selves and with God. Entering the promised land means facing up to who we are and what we've done. Sadly, many run away, preferring exile because of stupidity, trauma or hardness.

Thankfully, the Creator sends the Redeemer to find and retrieve those lost in exile. What matters is not the size of our problem but the wonder of the solution. In Jesus grace is embodied and life is unchained through resurrection.

PENTECOST

Next the church arrives with Pentecost. Forgiveness is modelled as the descendants of Isaac and Ishmael come together. God's Spirit is poured out on everybody. The Holy Spirit refreshes creation by stirring up a new humanity.

Pentecost is God's reminder that all of humanity is included in salvation. We are not a problem to be fixed but people empowered to continue Jesus' mission in the world. The church is not about me but us. God is able and willing to work through anyone no matter their age, ability, gender, ethnicity or orientation because 'everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved' (v.21).

God's story ends not with a threat or the smell of sulphur. It ends where it all began, with God - our Creator, Redeemer, and Sanctifier - who made, searches and welcomes those home who want to be found.

Simple support Great achievements

I received a call from a Case manager who, in the past, has brought many of their clients to St John's Care (SJC) for support. He told about a young man named Y. Y had moved to Australia last year to study at CIT. He was living on income support and barely managing to scrape by each fortnight.

In Y's first two terms, he topped his class and was subsequently offered a job opportunity through CIT. The job he was offered would earn him enough money to begin saving each week. It would also allow him sufficient time to continue studying.

The stumbling block that Y was facing was that he could not afford to pay for the training course he was required to complete, nor could he afford the clothes he needed to wear to work. Y was about to turn the offer down, until an educator from CIT encouraged him to reach out for support.

A few hours after the phone call, Y came into the SJC Centre with the support worker. We sat down and discussed ways in which we could assist him. I organised a couple of large bags of groceries for Y complete with meat, fruit and veg, hygiene products, cleaning supplies and non-perishable items. I called the training provider and was able to arrange a student discount. SJC then paid for the course and purchased some new clothing for Y using vouchers which had been donated to us.

Yesterday Y called to let me know that he had been working at his new job for a couple of weeks. He told me that he no longer needed to receive income support. He explained how gaining employment had motivated him further, and that it had truly changed his life. He thanked me for my help and the generosity of SJC. He hopes to be in a position to donate to St John's Care in the future.

As I reflected on my interactions with Y, I thought about the barriers that people face when on income support, and how one act of kindness can spur them onto much greater things.
