# Trusting & Doubting dou

**SUNDAY 18 JUNE 2023** 

THIRD SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

We are sometimes told to 'trust in God', that in keeping faith we will receive what we need, what we yearn for. We're similarly told that trusting in God's promise is opposed to doubting, that if we doubt we do not have faith in God. This is a rather unhelpful framework, because doubt is a natural and normal part of relating with God, as this reading from Genesis shows.

It's easy to sympathise with Sarah's doubt; it seems impossible to her that she could have a child, it's been impossible her whole life so far. There is so much bound up in this: a woman and wife of this period would have been expected to bear children, and a wife would be blamed if the marriage was childless. How many disappointments, tragedies, and heartbreaks would there have been for Sarah, before finally a time of resignation, that it was simply never going to happen. And now here is God, declaring it will happen, and next year! It seems to good to be true, and it is hard to give up the security of resignation for the possibility of

another heartbreak. So Sarah doubts, laughs to herself, and God overhears.

Two things we see in God's response to Sarah. God does not punish her. She is rebuked, called out for having doubted, but there is no declaration of punishment for her doubting, no signal that what she has done is sinful or immoral. Secondly, we can see that God does not retract the promise; Sarah's doubting and laughing does not lead to the decision to remove a blessing. Not only is Sarah not punished for her disbelief, but she also continues to be chosen for the blessing God had intended. Simply put, when we see these two together, we see that God isn't angry with Sarah.

This is to me, a heartening thing. God is not angry with us if we doubt at times if we struggle to believe in the promises or are reluctant to be vulnerable in belief. God will not rescind love and covenant just because we don't know how to take hold of them and keep them in ourselves. When we laugh, God simply laughs back, and tells us we've seen nothing yet.

#### Intersectionality

NJ and her three young children escaped family violence several years

ago. Her ex-partner and his family members recently found NJ's location and began harassing her.

English is NJ's second language. She does not have any family of her own in Australia and reports not having any friends. She has trouble communicating in English. When her ex-partner tracked her down, she did not know who to turn to for support. As she has been coming to St John's Care for food relief for several years, she reached out to us again for assistance.

As well as providing emotional support, we referred NJ to police to report the violence and to the Domestic Violence Crisis Service for counselling support. The service can also help her with emergency relocation to safety, and attendance at Court to apply for a Family Violence Order.

Intersectionality Theory is a framework that considers how overlapping social identities can lead to marginalisation, victimisation and discrimination. For example, social identities might include race, class, ethnicity, culture, religion, disability, socio-economic status and gender. When a client experiences family violence, it is therefore very important that workers also consider how other factors impact the person and how these can increase their vulnerability and risk of experiencing violence.

As an immigrant who has difficulty speaking English, and a woman who is in a lower socio-economic category, NJ is at heightened risk of experiencing violence. Her limited English makes her less likely to be able to seek the help that she needs to locate support services or engage with a community. By considering these different intersecting social identities, workers can assist NJ by designing support that addresses these risk factors.

We also referred NJ to an organisation that provides free English language courses and could link her to a women's cultural community group to decrease her social isolation. We also helped NJ to secure an appointment with a Centrelink Worker to review her income support, as we suspect that she is not receiving all benefits that she is entitled to.

Our thanks to our wonderful community who continue to support the work of St John's Care. Without you, we wouldn't be able to provide support to vulnerable Canberrans and help them to make real and lasting change in their lives.

# Christian Leaders

This week, we meet Jayne Ozanne.

Jayne is a remarkable leader. Jayne is a charismatic evangelical



Anglican who has worked in a variety of marketing, communications and fund-raising roles across the UK and Europe.

Her ministry as a layperson has been to help the Church of England better address its mission in the world. She has exercised this ministry as a member of the Archbishops' Council, General Synod, numerous local churches, and the Ozanne Foundation.

The Foundation believes in a world where 'all are accepted and equally valued.' It works with globally with religious organisations to eliminate discrimination based on sexuality or gender. She worked to help the Church of England ban conversion therapies (2017) aimed at altering a person's orientation.

Jayne writes of her own 20-year journey through a variety of harrowing conversion practices, including deliverance and exorcism ministry, in her book, Just love: a journey of self-acceptance (2018). Ironically, she found peace and a renewed spiritual life when she released her own self-condemnation and learnt to trust in God's love more deeply.

Fewer than a third of LGBTIQ+ Christians in the UK feel able to be themselves at church with many feeling constantly anxious and apprehensive about how they are treated. Jayne has helped me to understand why creating affirming spaces free from anxiety is important and the principles upon which it rests.
