Among many other things, Romans 12: 9-21 contains a list of practical outcomes to the ideal of living as a loving community, to being the good neighbours that our Parish Dream encourages us to be. This week, I want to look closely at Romans 12:13 "Contribute to the needs of the saints; extend hospitality to strangers".

Like so much of the Christian life, it's horribly easy to misinterpret the call to hospitality. The world would have us believe that hospitality is about showing off an immaculate household to , or our gourmet cooking ability.

Being a good neighbour means focussing on the needs of the guest, rather than the warm fuzzies the host is hoping for. Are we the type of host who is happy to invite someone into our messy home, to share a takeaway pizza in the loungeroom? Or do we need to impress the people we invite into our home? If we are focussed on inclusion and acceptance, then our guests are the centre of our attention.

Whether it's our individual homes, our church home, or the country we call home, we are only stewards of these spaces. What does our God of compassion and hospitality want us to do in and with these spaces?

These spaces are not just for us and our friends and family. They will also be places where others will find a listening ear and loving acceptance. And does it matter if we are busy with many things and our places and spaces are not the most palatial buildings on the street? No, it does not.

In Canberra today, there are many opportunities available for us to extend hospitality to strangers .Purchasing a 'pay it forward' beverage. Making sure that there are showers available for the folk who come along to our Pizza night. Amplifying Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander voices. How will you apply Romans 9:13 this week?

Safety at St John's

Care

H is a single mum who is 31 weeks pregnant with her third

child. She is receiving welfare payments, and until recently had hoped to raise her family in the home they had lived in for many years.

Unfortunately, like many other clients we support, H is escaping domestic violence, in fear for the safety of her family. I spoke with her on the phone.

I explained who I was and the many ways SJC supports people. H began to open up and talk about her relationship with the father of her children and some of the horrible abuse she had suffered. I sympathised with her thoughts and emotions and assured her that I would do everything I could to keep her safe.

We spoke for over an hour, and I offered H the opportunity to come to SJC for support after the Centre had closed, acknowledging her need for safety and privacy.

H attended the Centre that week and began to describe the effects of domestic violence on herself and her young children. The impacts of domestic violence extend beyond physical, psychological, and emotional factors and truly affect the day-today functioning of families.

The family had been forced to leave their home and seek refuge at a friend's house, H was unable to attend her part time job and the children were pulled out of school and their usual routines. Together we contacted the Domestic Violence Crisis Service (DVCS), and we discussed the 'Staying @ Home' program. This is a long-term service which aims to keep women and children in their homes following the breakdown of a relationship.

DVCS began the process of helping H apply for a family violence order (FVO) and started working on a safety plan for the family. After the conversation with DVCS, H broke down in tears. She was feeling not only huge emotion regarding her trauma but also relief about the support she was now receiving from SJC.

I packed a few large bags of grocery items for H and made sure it included snacks for her young kids. Each week since H first visited SJC, we have sat down and ticked off some tasks together – what once seemed a daunting 'to do list', now seems very achievable. I will continue to work with H and DVCS and hope to help facilitate a healthy transition back into the family's home.

Why think about creation?

Many churches around the world will celebrate the Season of Creation throughout September. This season starts on 1 September and concludes October 4, which celebrates the life of St Francis of Assisi.

The inclusion of creation in the calendar started in 2008 when the World Council of Churches sought to engage religious people more deeply with the growing environmental crisis affecting the planet. The Council called on humanity to exercise stewardship of creation rather than dominion over it.

Christians should pause and celebrate God's work of creation that surrounds us for one simple reason. Our theological vision of creation and God's part in it profoundly influences how Christian communities live, work and serve as good neighbours.

For generations, Christian thinking about creation was profoundly clouded by the fall. From this perspective, sin had not merely marred creation but fundamentally distorted it so that it was viewed as cursed and liable only to God's judgement and destruction.

This view had many unhelpful consequences. Jesus' work of salvation became little more than an escape plan to heaven above from earth below. Furthermore, if the world was corrupted then nothing in human life was to be trusted. It's not hard to see why so many Christian communities deny the value of science and ignore reason for the sake of preserving absolute biblical authority.

Christian thinking has moved in a different direction. It has come to see God's promise of a new creation not in terms of replacement but renewal and restoration. From this perspective, the goodness of the created realm is never completely overshadowed by human disobedience. Science and theology then are not in perennial conflict but areas of knowledge to be explored and investigated. Humanity is a part of nature, endowed with creativity and cultural capacity to improve life and act responsibly. Sin remains a problem, particularly ignorance and the desire to live in a consequence-free bubble.
