God's Generosity creates div

SEVENTEENTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

Matthew 20: 1-16

The gospel today ends with a question: "Are you envious because I am generous?"

The parable of the workers in the vineyard strikes at the heart of our notion of fairness. I'm sure we all remember as children, checking to see that we had the same amount of cordial in the glass as our siblings or the same share of whatever was being given out. Very early on, we develop a sense of what's fair and protest loudly if we think something is not fair, just like the workers who worked for the whole day.

In a world where we measure value by effort, then perhaps it's not fair. If we go back to the beginning of the reading, Jesus says: "The kingdom of God is like..." and then tells this parable. He ends with a focus on envy and generosity. Two different ways of being in the world. What's a worldview based on human effort or meritocracy like? It's a worldview of scarcity. That's what breeds envy. It says: "There's only a certain amount to go round and I will make sure I get my share. If someone else gets more, then there's not enough for me." This worldview

creates divisions, separates people and makes everything a competition for the finite resources available. Jesus is saying the Kingdom of God is **NOT** like this.

Jesus presents an alternative based on generosity – a worldview of grace. In this worldview everything is a gift and there is more than enough for everyone. Grace reveals the goodness of God. The only precondition of grace is that we show up and open ourselves to receive what God is giving. This parable invites us to see beyond what we think we deserve to the fathomless mystery of grace. We get so much more than what we deserve. This reminds me of one of my favourite quotes by Frederick Buechner: "Listen to your life. See it for the fathomless mystery it is. In the boredom and pain of it, no less than in the excitement and gladness ... because in the last analysis all moments are key moments, and life itself is grace."

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A life changing conversation

K hadn't been to St John's Care (SJC) Centre since 2022. When

he recently returned, I sat down with him to ask him how he had been.

K has been homeless for over 25 years. After the breakdown of his marriage and a deterioration of his mental health, he left the home he had lived in for most of his life. After some time couch surfing, he took to living on the streets and began using drugs. K visited Centrelink and got into an argument with one of the staff members. This led to him leaving and never returning.

This has meant that for over 25 years, K has received no welfare payments, and has relied solely on the support of community organisations, and generous individuals. During our conversation, K reflected on his negative experience with the staff member all those years ago. "I wasn't in a good place when I entered that building and when I left I decided I never wanted to go back. I lost trust in the system and society in general", he said.

We spoke at length about his regrets, his successes and his biggest challenges. K conceded that living without welfare payments made life incredibly difficult. While not having used drugs in 10 years, K had burned bridges with almost all his family and friends. His life consisted of travelling to various organisations for food and other types of support. K still had some unresolved mental health issues.

I could feel a level of trust being built between us and I offered to help K in applying for income support. After some moments of deliberation and some reassurance from me, K accepted my offer.

We booked and paid for a session with a GP and I referred K to an organisation which offers free sessions with a psychologist. I assisted K with filling in the appropriate paperwork and getting to and from his appointments. K has been back to SJC for food regularly and we have been able to provide him with a few other household items.

Last week K received his first welfare support payment. The excitement on his face was palpable. Over the coming weeks I will support K in applying for housing and hope to find him somewhere safe and stable to live.

It is amazing how powerful one conversation can be in changing the trajectory of someone's life forever.

Catherine Keller practices theology as a relation between ancient hints of ultimacy and current matters of urgency. As the George T. Cobb Professor of Constructive Theology in the Theological School and Graduate Division of Religion of Drew University, she teaches courses in process, political, and ecological theology. Within and beyond Christian conversation, she has all along mobilized the transdisciplinary potential of feminist, philosophical, and pluralist intersections with religion.

Keller's most recent book *Facing Apocalypse: Climate, Democracy, and Other Last Chances* is a "dreamreading" of our current global crisis particularly the threat of climate change and ecological devastation. Keller suggests that John's prophetic Apocalypse is not a foretelling of future events, but a parable of our present reality, which exposes the deep spiritual roots of these threats.

Synod Reflections

Representatives of ministry units and agencies from around the Diocese gathered in the Snow Concert Hall at the Canberra Grammar School for its Synod, a Greek word which means assembly or council. Anglicans don't always grasp the significance of this model for governance when much of our lives are lived in parishes or congregations.

Three dynamics are always evident when Synod gathers. First, the bishop is the president who sets the direction and shapes the culture of our church. Second, the bishops' office reports about their management, policies and vision for the future. Third, the people and not just the clergy get to participate by voicing their concerns and discussing matters of interest to them. Synod is a reminder that no parish lives in isolation and an encouragement that differences and even tensions exist that we are stronger together.

Our parish was represented by Wayne, Anne Ranse, Lynda McMinn, Merri Bacon, Belinda Moss and Russell Rollason. The following matters featured prominently in the Synod discussions:

1. Concern by evangelical leaders about trends of attendance. Average weekly attendance has fallen by 25% since 2017. This trend stirred calls for parishes to make greater efforts at evangelism particularly as the population of Canberra and the region is expected to double by 2060. Bishop Mark foreshadowed a diocese conference about evangelism in 2024.

2. The Revd Canon Associate Professor Uncle Glenn Loughrey was the synod guest speaker. He spoke strongly about the forthcoming referendum and explained the significance of connection between voice, treaty, truth-telling and Makarrata as the process for a renewed peace within the Uluru Statement from the Heart. Reactions were mixed. While many appreciated his reflections about the debate others were offended by his reflections about racism and Aboriginal spirituality.

3. Lynda led a debate about the diminishing level of with a standing acclamation.

women in full-time stipendiary roles as parish rectors. Ministry statistics presented often highlight how women comprise a third of clergy however Lynda showed how the actual number of women in parish leadership roles have diminished precipitously. In 2015, there were 1 woman bishop, 3 archdeacons and 13 rectors yet by 2023 this had diminished to 3 rectors, 0 archdeacons and a bishop soon to retire. The synod accepted her request for a working group to investigate this disparity, to talk with women about their experiences and identify appropriate remedial strategies.

4. Wayne led the debate asking the synod to express its support for the Voice. The conversation highlighted concerns about how the church should engage in political affairs. Some thought it was inappropriate for the church to express any view while others were dismayed that the church would consider being silent about core matters of equity and fairness in our country. Arguments appealing to ignorance, arrogance, mistrust and fragility were addressed. The Synod agreed to support the creation of a Voice 'as a vital step in walking together with First Nation's people towards reconciliation' by a very narrow margin (Yes – 86, No – 80, Abstentions – 12).

5. Russell presented a motion concerning poverty in Australia which drew attention to the rising number of children living below the poverty line. It welcomed the commitment to tax reform but requested the federal government ensure adequate funding for health, housing, education, aged and disability care, welfare and overseas aid at a time when there is much pressure for tax cuts to benefit the wealthiest Australians (Yes – 132, No – 4, Abstentions – 13).

6. Wayne advanced a motion of appreciation for Bob Arthur expressing the Synod's 'deep gratitude for the faithful, thoughtful and longstanding service' by Bob over five decades. It prayed for both Bob and Kath trusting that the journey ahead would be filled with faith, hope and love. It was accepted with a standing acclamation.
