Come As You Are?

SUNDAY 15 OCTOBER 2023

TWENTIETH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

Come as you are ... No need to fear, love sets no limits...(Hymn)

Today's gospel does not sit easily with these comforting words. Yet who kills the messenger because they don't want to be pestered with an invitation? Or which king takes revenge not only an individual offender but destroys the whole city where they live?

Perhaps exaggeration is used to make a point, as is the stark contrast between a generous, Inclusive invitation, where all are welcome, and the seemingly arbitrary decision to throw out one guest who turns up in the wrong clothes. Some scholars get round this by saying that wedding hosts in those days kept appropriate garments for such contingencies.

What is he thinking? He seems completely unaware of the occasion. Who invited him? Why does it matter that he is not wearing the wedding garment? The clothing metaphor runs through scripture. Adam and Eve try to cover their shame with fig leaves; later God makes clothing for them. Paul develops this metaphor in several places: he tells his readers to 'put on Christ' (Rom 13:14), 'clothe yourself with your new self' (Eph 4:22-24), and 'clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience' (Col 3:12). It takes time to gather a wardrobe like this, though. Yet we can always pray, 'We do not presume to come to your table, Lord, trusting in our own righteousness, but in your manifold and great mercies...' God is nothing if not realistic.

Yes we come as we are – How else can we come? God is with us even during those dark times of weeping and gnashing of teeth. But we must be ready to change. Love may have no limits, but it sets limits so that we can be all we are meant to be. Besides, there is a garment with our name on it. Why not try it on?

Conversations and therapeutic conversations

At St John's Care (SJC) Centre our days are increasingly busy. We

acknowledge that the needs of our community are growing and becoming progressively more complex.

Our volunteers demonstrate Jesus' compassion to all who enter our doors, providing unconditional respect and encouragement through listening, and sharing time by way of conversation. They then prepare emergency relief food and personal care packages, individualising these packages so that they relate to the person and family circumstances. The time that volunteers give and the respectful conversations which take place with our clients gives hope and illustrates compassion.

Within Case Management we spend time with our clients having therapeutic conversations. It is important that we support clients not only practically but also by encouraging self-determination through a strengths-based approach. The client determines the challenges and works together with SJC Case Managers to achieve their goals. By working through this supportive framework individuals and families receive the respect, compassion, encouragement and often advocacy they feel they require. Thus, this partnership with our clients empowers them to understand that they are worthy, that there is a brighter tomorrow and that SJC is here to support them in their journey.

Supporting a client in Case Management means taking time to have therapeutic conversations. We complete assessments that look at family structures and safety concerns. We highlight life challenges, formulate plans to work towards, and advocate in terms of support and communication with other organisations. Importantly we highlight our clients' strengths, their coping mechanisms, their support networks and then work out the next steps. This process takes time but is essential to the relationship with our clients and being able to support their needs. Often when in dark times it is difficult to see the light in life and through building relationships we can assist in this process.

One example of the importance of building relationships, and therapeutic conversations: I received a message that someone required food to be urgently delivered. After speaking with them for some time, I was able to unpack what was happening. We talked about safety, and they shared a little of their trauma story and their fear of seeking medical assistance. Together we spoke about the physical pain they were currently experiencing and worked through barriers and strategies toward seeking medical treatment. They called me back to confirm that they now had sought medical attention and to thank me for the support they received through our therapeutic conversations. They told me they had felt accepted. By providing unconditional support, acknowledging their strengths, and the offer of future support, SJC had given them the confidence and belief that they were worthy and able to continue their current challenges.

The sign up sheets for fete volunteers are on the back noticeboard. There's a wealth of volunteering opportunities available both before, during and after the fete.


Coordinators are still needed for the cake stall and signage — important roles to make sure that the publicity and the stall run smoothly.

A note from the Parish treasurer
