Love—Matt 22:34-46

'You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind.'
This is the greatest and first commandment. And a second is like it: 'You shall love your neighbour as yourself.'
(Matt 22:37-8)

What the world needs now is love, sweet love, not just for some but for everyone. The words of this 1965 hit might sound trite, but that isn't to deny their profound truth. Though I am not so sure about the 'sweet'... Certainly Jesus' version is more robust, all-encompassing and challenging. Who can say they come anywhere near obeying this commandment? Especially when Jesus' radical interpretation includes not only kin and tribe, but enemies and those we perceive as different from ourselves. Especially when we are all wounded in our capacity to love on this scale.

For Jesus, love of God and love of neighbour are two sides of the one coin. Scripture reminds us that we can't claim to love God if

we don't love others. Jesus calls us to align ourselves with the heart and mind of God – to try to see as God sees, and love as God loves. Moving beyond the fear driven division and polarising spirit so evident in our world – and if we are honest within ourselves. This is what loving God with mind and heart means.

One of the most practical definitions of love I have heard is that love is paying attention and then responding rather than reacting. Really seeing and listening to others – and oneself – rather than prematurely deciding what is best for them/us. Ring any bells? Maggie Ross (*Icon of the Heart*) applies this to intercessory prayer: *'True prayer tries to gather what needs attention and let go of it in the love of God'*. Both movements are needed – the gathering what needs attention and the letting go into the inclusive, creative love of God, with whom nothing is wasted and all in the end is Love's harvest.

Specialised support

St John's Care (SJC) has been supporting a young couple (A and B), and their three children since

their arrival in Australia three years ago. I have visited them at their home to drop off food when they were unable to afford petrol and we have chatted on the lawns of St John's. I have watched their family grow and experience periods of joy and elation and I have watched the family struggle and experience the lowest of lows.

A and B came to Australia on study visas with the intention of gaining a level of education that is not offered in their country. They knew moving to another country with two young children and limited resources would be difficult.

A and B noticed their daughter K wasn't reaching some developmental milestones; this was especially evident during K's first week of school. She was unable to engage with teachers or other students and learn in a class environment and was bullied by some of her peers.

Over the next 6 months, A and B spent their money having various tests to determine what K's condition might be and working out the best way to support her. They regularly attended St John's Care for support with food and scripts and worked as often as their visa conditions allowed. I recall many tearful conversations where A and B were uncertain about how they could afford to provide necessities for their kids as well as specialist support for K.

A and B sought constantly to provide their children with the upbringing that they never had themselves. SJC were able to provide weekly food support including nappies, and fresh food to ease the financial burden. After liaising with ActewAGL, we switched the family to a cost effective energy plan and contributed towards the energy bill.

I wrote an application for a school which specialises in supporting children with intellectual disabilities. K was accepted to begin the following term. SJC helped A and B access financial support for education, and paid for K's uniforms, as well as providing her with a school backpack. After her first week at school, K visited SJC with her parents after school and the difference in her demeanour, confidence and overall personality was striking. K has made gradual yet exciting progress in her literacy, numeracy and communication skills. K has made friends and been invited to another child's birthday party – something she had never experienced before.

A and B complete their studies next month; having found a nurturing environment for K and embedding themselves in the community, they now call Canberra home. Their next challenge is applying for visas which will allow them to stay in Australia beyond 2024. As always, St John's Care will be there to support them on that journey.

Christian Leaders— Shane Clifton

Clifton's academic background is in theology and ethics. In 2010, he incurred a spinal cord injury that left him with incomplete quadriplegia. Drawing on the virtue ethics tradition and disability studies, Clifton focused his research on happiness and flourishing with a disability. In 2013 he joined the Centre for Disability Research and Policy as an honorary associate, working with the centre to write *Crippled Grace: Disability, Virtue Ethics and the Good Life*. He spent four years as a researcher and Policy Director at Australia's Royal Commission into Violence, Abuse, Neglect and Exploitation of People with Disability. His second book, written jointly with his wife Elly, is *Husbands Should Not Break: A Memoir about the Pursuit of Happiness after Spinal Cord Injury*.

Clifton describes his theology like this: "I taught theology for two decades. I have learned that speech about god is too often a claim to white, masculine, straight, abled power, but that the god

revealed in Jesus is our loving Mother and gracious Father, the divine Spirit who resists our theological certainties. I seek god in truth, goodness, and beauty."


Seeking donations for the Book Stall


