God's Blessings

Matthew 5: 1-12

How often do we hear the Beatitudes? From church leaders in cathedrals to comedy groups like Monty Python, these words of Jesus are often referenced. They are one of those bits of the Gospel that even non-Christians have some understanding of, and which shape the idea and image of who Jesus is. We may know in some sense what the Beatitudes are, but as is often the case with Scripture we know well, it is worth it to look deeper.

The surface meaning of the Beatitudes is commonly centred on Jesus' salvation ministry. The poor in spirit are those aware of their sinfulness, the mourners are those who mourn their sin. and so on. This reading is entirely legitimate, but there is more to Jesus' words here, about what the kingdom of God and the followers of Christ should be like. If we reflect on the words of Jesus, we can see a clear outline of who God stands with, and what kinds of people Jesus hopes we will be as we are renewed by God's love and grace.

Blessing the poor in spirit connects not only to being aware

of sin, but to the spirits of the oppressed and the broken hearted as referenced in the Psalms and Isaiah, to name only two examples (Ps. 34:18, Is. 57:15). Jesus' blessing of those who mourn is not only a follow up on sinfulness, but also a blessing to those suffering, and to those who weep with them. Simply put, to mourn something or someone is to feel, keenly, for them; you cannot mourn that which you do not love. The meek, or humble, are uplifted to power over the haughty and powerful, and those who show mercy to others receive it in return. And of course, God blesses those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, which can mean not only to hunger for the righteousness of God, but to feel keenly the need for justice and peace in the world.

As Christians, we are called not to simply to shut ourselves off from the world, to be aware of sin and earnestly hope God will save (just) us. Rather, Jesus wants us to care about the world, to be agents of justice, love, peace, and hope. In this way, the church can be a light on a hill.

Seeking support to keep a roof over their heads

L recently came to the St John's Care (SJC) Centre for the first time. She explained that until recently she'd had a part time job and paid all her bills with money from her job and Centrelink payments. L said that a couple of weeks ago she lost her job, and what she receives from Centrelink is barely enough to pay her rent. L was looking for help with food, nappies, petrol and above all with school supplies and clothes as school starts soon.

L and I came to an agreement SJC would help her with food on a weekly basis (fruits, vegetables, meats, non-perishable food) and the needs of her two children such as nappies, lunch box snacks, etc.

SJC referred L to *Thread Together* for support with essential clothing and school uniforms. We were then able to give her lunch boxes, backpacks, school shoes and school supplies. We also contacted the Actew-AGL financial hardship team; and informed then about the sudden change in L's income. The Actew-AGL team was kind enough to work with L, developing personal and practical solutions to help keep the electricity and/or gas supply connected, as well as tailoring a flexible payment plan.

L was very happy with all the help she received. As rent increases year after year, it is extremely difficult for a single parent to cover all the expenses. L will do everything she can to keep a roof over the family's heads; she understands that if she can't cover the rent and her other payments it would mean leaving the house and becoming homeless.

SJC works with families of various structures within our community to assist those in need, helping them get back on their feet and gain independence. This is one of our hardest tasks as Centrelink payments are not enough for people to get by in our community. Considering all of this, we take every opportunity to thank everyone in our churches and community who donate to SJC. These donations, be they gifts-in-kind or financial donations, provide us with the items we need to support vulnerable people and families.

Items Required: Cup a soup, adult toothpaste, vegemite, shampoo, conditioner, milk and school lunch snacks.

Revd Susanna Pain is inviting those interested to join her on a five week retreat in daily life.


The retreat involves optional Sunday afternoon gatherings for reflection, prayer, meditation

GROWING SPIRITUALLY IN 2023


The massive Sequoia trees of California might grow large but they grow slowly. Similarly, our spiritual lives emerge through many small steps over a long time. It too requires care and attention.
