A good conscience?

There's a fascinating sentence in this week's Epistle. "And baptism, which this prefigured, now saves you—not as a removal of dirt from the body, but as an appeal to God for a good conscience, through the resurrection of Jesus Christ" (1 Peter 3:21). This is a reminder of the fact that there is more to our faith than the fact that Jesus died for our sins (penal substitutionary atonement). God doesn't have to do all the work! Through the resurrection, we have an opportunity to work with God to change ourselves and our world for the better.

So what does appealing to God for a good conscience actually look like? And what can we do with that during Lent and throughout the year?

Walter Rauschenbusch suggests that any appeal for a good conscience will involve a request to remove our moral and political complacency. Oscar Romero encourages us to pray that God will protect us from numbness to

the pain of other, and equip us to begin to take action on their behalf.

Lent is a great time to focus on our consciences, as we have an opportunity to apply the three pillars of Lent: prayer, fasting and charity. Pope Francis talks about the development of conscience as "learning to change our attitude towards others and all of creation, turning away from the temptation to devour everything to satisfy our voracity and being ready to suffer for love, which can fill the emptiness of our hearts".

There's an abundance of Lenten resources available on the Internet. My personal favourites are Lent Event, which this year is focussed on action to mitigate the impacts of climate change on the most vulnerable, and Common Grace, who provide a weekly video series each Lent.

How are you developing your conscience this Lent? And how will that flow on to influence your actions in the rest of 2024?

Satisfaction Survey

The St John's Care

(SJC) satisfaction survey aims to measure clients' satisfaction across several domains including the quality and range of food offered, quality of service provided by staff and volunteers, overall experience, and likelihood to recommend SJC to others.

We are pleased that despite the increase in numbers that we have seen over the past 12 months, the most recent survey scores have generally improved.

This year's survey found that 98% of community members who we support 'strongly agree' with the survey item "I would highly recommend St John's Care to others". In understanding the significance of these findings, it is important to note the tireless work of our volunteers and staff members. They constantly strive to improve service delivery with the goal of improving client outcomes.

The survey also asks clients "what was the most helpful thing that SJC did to support you?". Here are some of the responses:

"When I was pregnant, they helped me out with lots of baby clothes, toys and costs, making sure I had support to provide for my baby".

"Listened to me without any judgement. Assisted us with food, without their help we would have been hungry for days."

"They took the time to understand my needs and were welcoming on the first visit. They have always helped in times of need and have been like a little family to me in Canberra. I appreciate everything."

"Conversation and friendship, just continue on!"

These words are reminders of the profound impact that donors, volunteers, supporters, and staff members can have on some of the most vulnerable members of the community.

I hope that hearing these words continues to encourage and inspire you in the same way that it does me.
