Womb-like Love (Luke 6.27-38)

"But I say to you that listen, love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who abuse you." (Luke 6:27-28).

My initial response to this command from Jesus is utter denial. "It's OK for you Jesus, you're the Son of God. You can pull off stuff like this without breaking a sweat. But I'm just human, and you are asking too much. I can't possibly love someone who physically abused me, or who hurt my kids, or who believes that empathy is a sin. You can't expect that from me."

Yet, there are humans who can do this. One of their tools in found in Luke 6:36: "Be merciful, just as your Father is merciful". A literal translation of the Aramaic word expressed here as "merciful" is "womb-like". In 'Taking Jesus Seriously' Marcus Borg says: "What does it mean to be womb-like? ... It means to be lifegiving, nourishing. It means to feel what a mother feels for the children of her womb: tenderness, willing their well-being, finding her children precious and beautiful. It can also mean a fierceness, for a mother can be fierce when she sees the children of her womb being threatened or treated destructively." Mercy doesn't have to be soft and fuzzy; it can also be fierce and passionate.

The situation in Ukraine is a clear demonstration of the need for fierce love and mercy. Tribal tendencies to settle for the kind of peace that benefits "our people" is what's being demonstrated by Putin and Trump. Real peace, the peace that Jesus is talking about when he says "blessed are the peacemakers" comes from justice. And that's justice for everyone, not just the people in our tribe or the people who think like us. Real peace and justice in Ukraine can only be achieved when Russia, Ukraine and the rest of Europe are involved in the peace making and peace keeping process.

Few if any of us here at Holy Covenant can influence peace in Ukraine. But we can apply fierce and passionate womb-like love to our own situations. Let's love with the kind of ferocity that takes the initiative away from those who hate and breaks hateful systems apart. Let's love like Martin Luther-King and other non-violence practitioners and change the world.

But since they had stayed awake, they saw his glory. Luke 9:28



Last week, we welcomed back our long-term client, who we will call A. Living in regional New South Wales, A had travelled to the ACT

seeking legal support when their car was stolen—a distressing event that left A without essential medication, as it was in the stolen vehicle.

A approached St John's Care (SJC) for assistance in returning to NSW with their children and pet. Recognising the urgency, I contacted several services in Canberra to arrange transportation, but initial efforts were unsuccessful. Fortunately, Tumut District Community Transport, which has been serving the Snowy Valleys Region for over 30 years, agreed to help. They promptly organised for A and their family to be picked up the next day by a dedicated volunteer driver with over 10 years of experience.

Given that A couldn't return to regional NSW the same day, we secured emergency accommodation for the family on short notice, thanks to our strong community reputation. Upon learning that A and the children hadn't eaten for the past three days, we provided a hot meal and supplied groceries for their journey. Additionally, our volunteers prepared school packs for the children, ensuring they were ready to return to school the following Monday.

Through our script assistance program, in collaboration with Campbell Pharmacy and Pharmacy on Northbourne, we addressed A's medication needs. By coordinating with A's pharmacy in NSW, we arranged for the prescription to be sent to Pharmacy on Northbourne, allowing A to promptly take the necessary medication.

A and their children were overwhelmed by the support, love, and care they received from SJC and our partner organisations. They expressed deep gratitude for alleviating their immediate concerns, while the ACT Police handled the stolen car incident.

To our amazing donors, your support of St John's Care extends beyond meeting physical needs; you impact every area of individuals' lives during their most challenging times. Thank you for your unwavering support, love, and compassion toward the community. We also extend our gratitude to the community agencies we partner with in supporting those in need.

Exploring Lent

Lent is a 40-day period prior to Easter. Traditionally, it commemorates how Jesus spent 40 days in the wilderness prior to commencing his public ministry. It is a window to understanding better Jesus' character, purpose and ministry that led to the cross and beyond.

Christians engage with Lent in many ways, taking either the way of ascent or descent by incorporating some simple disciplines, practices or service into their daily routines.

The way of ascent is a bit like climbing a mountain, upwards towards God in order to enhance our awareness, understanding or experience of God through obedience. This approach emphasises more of God and less of me. It adopts spiritual disciplines like fasting and self-denial by giving up certain luxuries such as sweets or habits like social media. New spiritual practices like attending church more regularly or reading Scripture more fully are also helpful. Some might prefer to engage in new acts of service by volunteering or caring for those around them.


The way of descent is more like swimming in the ocean. It enhances our awareness, understanding or experience of God by becoming more attuned to how God is with us. The disciplines, practices and acts of service are tuned to help us see, know and participate in God's love. Disciplines like prayer encourage us to listen more deeply to God rather than simply talking at them. Practices like meditation can help attune our lives to God's heart. Acts of service help us to see God's presence in the people around us.

At Holy Covenant, you can explore Lent in two ways. Both streams will overlap at various points.

A study group exploring *Jesus: a pilgrimage*, will meet on Tuesdays from 4-5pm. People can share stories, insights and community together.

A more personal pilgrimage will also be available. This will consist of weekly readings and reflections that you can take by yourself.




