

### **TRINITY SUNDAY 15.6.25**

In a world filled with uncertainty, divisions, warfare, rising costs, epidemics of anxiety and depression, climate crises and economic turbulence many people look for hope to counter the gloom. People hope for good exam results, for loving relationships, a good career, for material comfort, for good health. Often it is little more than wishful thinking or optimism.

Hope in the Christian context is the cornerstone of faith. It is woven through out Scripture as both a promise and way of life. We desire the Kingdom of Heaven and eternal life placing our trust in God's promises. We rely on the strength of God through the Holy Spirit. Hope in the Christian sense is imbued with passion and grounded in the final victory of the creative, self-expending, community forming love of the triune God. Trinity Sunday is an opportunity to express the hope we have that the love of God will triumph over hate, justice over injustice, freedom over bondage, peace over war and life with God over death. And yet death seems so prevalent and pervasive in this world. How can this be reconciled with hope?

Jesus made it clear that suffering is an inherent part of following him. We are invited to accept our crosses as Jesus did. Unlike Buddhism that treats suffering as an illusion, the Christian faith faces it directly yet buoyed by hope that love will win.

In Romans 5, Paul reminds us to "glory in our sufferings". It is often in suffering that we are most vulnerable and seek to be closer to God. Suffering and hope are an inherent part of our life journey and are inextricably connected as the former gives birth to the latter. Christian hope is not a virtue enabling personal goal achievement. It is a response to God's gifts and promised intentions. Hope is based in relying in faith in God's actions. That action is manifest most clearly in the suffering of Christ and the overcoming of that pain and death through the resurrection. This is the ground for our hope that in raising Christ, no one is ever left behind.

### What is love?


For God so loved the world that he gave his only son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life. John 3:16

### **Reaching milestones**



Four years ago, a quiet but resilient family first walked through our doors—a

devoted mother and her two teenage children, each carrying more than their share of life's burdens. Over time, their faces have become familiar, and their story has become one of courage, hardship, and hope.

The family's struggles have been significant. The mother, a kind and soft-spoken woman, has faced ongoing financial hardship for years, doing her best to provide for her children. More recently, her world was turned upside down when she was diagnosed with cancer. As her health declined, the weight of day-to-day responsibilities began to fall more heavily on her children—two teenagers trying to navigate their own lives while caring for the person who has always cared for them.

Despite the immense pressure, these young people have shown remarkable determination. Over the years, St John's Care has supported them with regular food assistance, support with transport and prescriptions, a listening ear, and help managing the complex emotional toll of their situation. Sometimes, simply having someone to talk to—a place where they feel safe, seen and supported, makes all the difference.

Recently, the family's daughter reached out for help with something that felt out of reach amid the chaos: booking driving lessons and applying for university. Despite her drive and determination, she was limited by the necessary resources to achieve these goals. Together, we worked through each step—connecting her with the right supports, helping her complete applications, and encouraging her every step of the way.

Last week, she proudly received her provisional driver's licence, and just days later, she was accepted into university.

As she drove up the driveway to St John's Care, I reflected on how significant these moments are for her, and for her whole family. They are reminders that even in the darkest of times, hope can take root—and with the right support, people can begin to rebuild.
